**Death of Willie B. Warren.**

The following letter from Jno. J. Sherman, conveys the sad intelligence of the death of Willie B., son of Hon. B. L. Warren. We tender to Bro. Warren and his stricken family our heartfelt sympathy in this, their time of great affliction:

DEAR SIR:—You have no doubt heard before this of the illness of Willie B. Warren, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robt' L. Warren. He died at noon to-day.

About four weeks ago Mrs. Warren came to Lansing accompanied by her children, to visit her mother and sister who reside here. About two weeks since the illness of Willie began and continued with increasing severity and with intense suffering, until Friday last, when a change for the better was noted and it was supposed that he was improving. However, he had not sufficient strength to enable him to rally, and at 12 m. to-day he passed away. In the death of their son, Mr. and Mrs. Warren and their family suffer a fearful loss, and their entire circle of relatives and acquaintances will feel deep sympathy for them.

Willie was eleven years of age and was an unusually bright boy intellectually as well as physically robust. For these reasons his untimely death will, to his parents and friends, be all the harder to bear. The funeral will take place on Thursday of this week at Albion. Very Truly Yours, JNO. J. SHERMAN.

**The Lawrence Baby Show.**

As previously advertised the Good Templars of Lawrence gave a baby show at Marshall's hall, on Friday evening of last week. There was a large crowd of people in attendance. Their judges, as advertised, were O. W. Rowland of Paw Paw, Mrs. J. S. Heath of Hartford, and A. E. Jennings of Deatur. Mr. Jennings not being on hand in season, Hon. C. J. Monroe of South Haven, was substituted in his place.

In the first class, babies under one year old, there were thirteen entries. The prize, a gold-lined silver cup, was awarded to Stephen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Irwin Plopper.

In the second class, babies between the ages of one and two years, there were seven entries, and the prize, a child's silver set, three pieces, was captured by Gertie M. daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry A. Wells.

Babies between the ages of two and three years constituted the third class, in which there were seven entries. The prize, a gold ring, was given to Hattie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pezies.

After the prizes were awarded, the people enjoyed themselves in social converse, eating ice cream, etc. The gross receipts of the society were a little more than twenty dollars.

Lawrence can certainly boast of a large crop of handsome babies. The judges were sorry there were but three prizes to be awarded to 27 children and not a homely one in the lot. They found their position to be a very delicate one and the selection to be a difficult matter. They knew the babies only by number, not by name, so that they were enabled to make a fair award according to their best judgment, which, no doubt, varied a good deal from that of the fond mothers whose children did not win a prize. There was no murmuring, however, over the matter, at least not in presence of the committee of awards.

**Death of Frederick Lord.**

Frederick Lord, who passed peacefully from earth, last Friday evening, at his residence in this village, was born at South Berwick, Me., on the twelfth day of April, 1807, being at the time of his death in his 78th year.

He removed to this county in 1839, and has resided therein ever since. He was well known to the people of this community and in an early day, when in the prime and vigor of his manhood, was frequently honored with the suffrages of his fellow citizens. He was one of the first members of the bar who settled in Van Buren county and held the office of Prosecuting Attorney at a time when that office was appointive and not elective. He was elected County Treasurer in 1840, the next year after his arrival here, and four years afterwards was elected Judge of Probate. At that time there were in Michigan what were known as County Courts, presided over by a county judge and side judges, or second judges. In 1847 Mr. Lord was elected to the office of second judge, and in 1850 was elected Prosecuting Attorney. In politics he inclined to and usually acted with the democratic party, though, for some years past, he has been wont to boast of his independence in political matters. Religiously he was a strong believer in the doctrines of modern spiritualism, and took great pleasure in conversing on that topic. He did not die of disease, but passed quietly away as though dropping into a peaceful sleep. He had been gradually failing for quite a long time, and his death was not wholly unexpected, although he had been confined to his bed but three or four days. The machine was worn out, the weights had run down, and the pendulum of life ceased to beat; the end had come.

His funeral took place last Sunday, Elder Brooks officiating. He was laid to rest on Prospect Hill.
