Activity prevails at the Crystal Springs camping grounds this summer. Upwards of forty lots have been sold. New cottages are building, and it is expected that this year will eclipse all others in the interest taken in the meetings.

Company C, fourth Michigan cavalry, held its fourteenth annual reunion at Four Mile lake last Thursday. Twenty of the old boys were present. Col. Robert Burns, of Kalamazoo, attended the camp fire held in the evening. Ed. A. Crane was the orator.

Housekeepers will do well to bear in mind that twenty drops of carbolic acid, evaporated from a hot shovel, will go far to banish flies from a room, while a piece of camphor gum the size of a walnut, held over a lamp till it is consumed, will answer the same purpose.

The Michigan men who went to Gettysburg last week to participate in the dedication of the Michigan monuments, had a most disagreeable experience. The rain poured down in torrents most of the time, accommodations were limited and the interest of the occasion was materially dimmed by the necessity of holding the exercises in a rink instead of on the field.

Those who made the acquaintance, at the reunion last summer, of the Rev. E. H. Harvey of Paw Paw (brother to Pastor Harvey of the Allegan Presbyterian church) will be more than pleased to learn that President Harrison has determined to appoint him pension agent at Detroit upon expiration, a few months hence, of Mr. McKinstry's term. Such is the gist of recent Washington dispatches.—*Allegan Gazette.*

The crop report for the month ending June 10th, from the office of the secretary of state, shows the condition of wheat in the southern counties to be 87 per cent of an average—a loss of 3 per cent since May 1st; in the central counties 92 per cent—a loss of 5 per cent, and in the northern counties 95 per cent—a loss of 4 per cent. The crop is several days more forward than last year. The area of corn, oats and barley is about the same as last year, but an average of 7 per cent of the corn area failed to grow, and the crop has been greatly damaged by worms and frost. Potatoes also have suffered greatly from frost. Apples range from 54 to 82 per cent of an average crop—the lower figure in the northern counties and the higher in the southern. Peaches promise 69 per cent of a crop.

On the 2d day of June, 1889, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. White, of Antwerp, had traveled the rough and rugged road of life together for fifty years, and a few of their many friends and neighbors, remembering the fact, called on the worthy couple to tender their congratulations. As their visit was unexpected and unannounced, they took refreshments with them, and a very pleasant afternoon was passed. The old people have enjoyed life well; been blessed with health and plenty, and have faithfully discharged all the duties of life as they have presented themselves. A family of ten children has been assigned to their care and guidance, all of whom are living and doing well—in this state and one in Virginia. Of grand-children they have forty living. With excellent health still theirs, their friends hope for many more years of usefulness for these aged people.

Death of Chauncey Cumings.  
Once more the grim reaper thrusts in his sickle and gathers the ripened sheaf. Chauncey Cumings was called home at two o'clock last Sunday morning, at the mature age of eighty-three years. He had been in poor health for some time, but up to last Friday had been about as usual. On that day he came down to the village and while here was taken seriously ill with pneumonia, which resulted as above indicated. Deceased was one of our most highly respected citizens, widely known and universally esteemed. He came to Michigan with his family in 1854, and has been a resident of this township continuously since that time. About eight years ago he buried his wife, with whom he had lived upwards of fifty years. The funeral was from the late residence at 10 a. m. Tuesday, conducted by Rev. E. H. Harvey, and the remains were laid to rest at Prospect Hill. His two sons, E. W., from Buffalo, and A. W., from Detroit, accompanied by their wives, arrived Sunday night.

### Punishment of Chinese Officials.

The director general in China suggested that the officers in charge of the Yellow River works who showed remissness in not taking precautionary measures to prevent the recent floods be degraded, but this was deemed too light a punishment, and they were ordered to be exposed in the canals along the river banks. The sub-prefect and mayor of Shang-an, the assistant department magistrate of Cheng-Chou, and the lieutenant and second sergeant of the station below Cheng-Chou were thus punished.

The canque, or wooden collar, which these unfortunates are condemned to wear, is a large, heavy square of wood, opening so as to allow the prisoner's neck to enter. From the time it is put on it is not removed till the term of the sentence has expired—a time varying from a fortnight to three months. During the whole time the prisoner cannot lie down or rest with any comfort, and during the day is placed in a conspicuous place, with his name and offense written in large characters on the great wooden collar, that all passers by may read. The compassionate people occasionally feed the victim, as it is impossible for him to reach his head with his hand; but the gamins tickle him with straws and otherwise annoy him.—*New York Sun.*

### Curious Case of Hypnotism.

Louise Michel, or the "Red Virgin," as she is called from her antiseptic morality and her revolutionary opinions, is gradually recovering from her bonnet. After the surgeons had spent two or three days vainly probing for the bullet which was supposed to be lodged in her head at the base of the brain, they began to look grave and talked of pyemia, abscesses and such like. There was a good laugh when the bullet was finally found, by accident, sticking in the virgin's bonnet, where no one had thought of looking for it. A goodly number of the "Reds" have always had, and still has. Her last hobby is the defense of the man who fired at her. She says she thinks that the man was "hypnotized" by her eloquence, and that he fired "in a moment of hallucination." She has engaged, at her own expense, the famous criminal lawyer, Laguerre, to defend him, and meanwhile she advises his removal to the care of Dr. Charcot, as she thinks the case of a man "hypnotized" by the exposition of ideas above his intelligence," a very curious one and deserving of careful study.—*Paris Cor. New York Journal.*

The advance agent manages for a game with a local nine on the afternoon of the arrival of the company. The Tlespians always allow the local nine to beat them as an inspiration to local pride.
