

State Convention.

The enthusiastic and harmonious spirit of the big Republican convention at Detroit, augurs well for the sweeping victory predicted in the stirring speeches there delivered. Ex-Congressman Allen, chairman of the convention, made a very clever hit in his introductory address by referring to the Republican defeat in the Congressional elections of 1890 as a political Chancellorsville, to be followed this fall by a political Gettysburg at which history should surely repeat itself in a reversal of that defeat. The fact that the delegates to Minneapolis were left uninstructed, will receive but one interpretation at the national convention, viz., that, barring Blaine, Harrison is the real choice of the Republicans of Michigan. However, Gen. Alger's personal popularity in the Wolverine state, together with the feeling of indignation felt at the dastardly attempt to blacken his reputation as a brave soldier, will undoubtedly gain for him at least a complimentary vote from the Michigan delegation.

A Good Choice.

It is an indirect compliment to a town when one of its citizens gains complimentary mention in the surrounding papers, and several times of late we have noted such mention of our farmer-citizen, Hon. J. J. Woodman, whom every one knows to be thoroughly worthy of public approval.

Now that Mr. Woodman has finally consented to have his name come before the public as a candidate for Congress from the Fourth District, we find, as we expected, a hearty satisfaction manifested by the Press of Van Buren County, and several of our exchanges last week devoted considerable space to a review of the qualities that fit him for the position.

The following article from the Hartford *Day Spring* is so complete that we gladly give space for its insertion and warmly endorse its every statement. The new Fourth Congressional District is formed of the counties of Barry, Allegan, Van Buren, Berrien, Cass, and St. Joseph. It has a population of 180,000. It is emphatically a district of farmers. It contains no town of over 5,000 inhabitants and 80 per cent. of its population live in the country, or in villages of less than a thousand people.

Its most fitting representative there would be a farmer, a man who not only owns a farm, but lives on it, and by practical, everyday experience knows the needs and wants of a farmer's life. But he should be more than this. He should be a man of affairs, acquainted with public life and conscious of the greatness of the nation among whose councils he sits. He should have a mind broad enough to take in the needs and rights of all classes, and liberal enough to legislate for the general good.

There are few such men in this or any other Congressional district, but Van Buren county has such a man, and it would delight to honor him and itself by making him the first Congressman from the new Fourth. This man is Hon. J. J. Woodman of Paw Paw. He now lives and has lived for a generation on the farm from which his own labor and management have wrought him a competence. He is therefore a farmer of the most practical kind. But he is also a man of large understanding of public affairs. For six successive terms, from '61 to '72 he was a member of the State Legislature, and for the last two terms was speaker of the house. Those were the days when state affairs were more closely allied to national affairs than they are to-day, and the experience of that twelve years will be worth much, both to him and his constituents, in the halls of Congress. He served as U. S. Commissioner to the World's Fair at Paris in 1876, and has been master of the State and National Granges, and has through all these years kept up his interest in political and public life. His acquaintance throughout the district is large and will be a strong element in his favor. As a speaker he is clear, candid, and convincing, and his personal canvass of the district as the Republican candidate for Congressional honors will be worth many votes to the entire ticket.

Van Buren county is unanimous for him and, while conceding the equal rights of every other county to present the claim of a "favorite son," will maintain that no more able, or available, or more thoroughly representative candidate is to be found than Hon. J. J. Woodman of Paw Paw.

The Democratic State Convention at Harrisburg, Pa., varied the usual order of business by a fistfight or two, during which the sergeant-at-arms fled from the hall.

Every mention of the "Plumed Knight" at the Detroit convention was the signal for an outburst of applause which attests the universal popularity of America's leading statesman.
