For Memorial Day.

H'D Q'RS BROADHEAD POST, No. 31, DEPT OF MILITARY, G. A. R. GENERAL ORDER No. 1.

1st. Our rules and regulations prescribe among the duties of our order the general observance of the 30th day of May as Memorial Day. In compliance with general orders from national and department headquarters, this post will observe said day by performing the sad duty of decorating with flowers the graves of our sacred dead.

2d. Flags will be displayed at half mast.

3d. The members will assemble at the post room at 9 o'clock a. m. of said day. Comrades appointed to decorate soldiers' graves in the following cemeteries, viz: The Old, the Bangs, the Clapp, the Catholic, the Wildey, the Cuddeback, will perform that duty in a proper manner and return to post room and join the command. The post will fall in in uniform in the following order at 10:30 a. m.: 1st, martial band; 2d, color bearer with colors; 3d, vocal music; 4th, firing squad; 5th, officers of the post; (except S. V. Com. and J. V. Com., officer of the day, surgeon, chaplain, quartermaster and officer of the guard). The comrades will form in two ranks to the left of the officers—the sergeant major on the right of the post, quartermaster sergeant on his left. S. V. Com. will occupy a position two paces in the rear of the right platoon and the J. V. Com. will occupy a position two paces in the rear of center of the left platoon; 6th, president and members of village board; 7th, fire department; 8th, fraternal orders; 9th, principal of school and teachers and scholars; 10th, citizens in carriages; 11th, flowers.

The post will take up its line of march to Prospect Hill cemetery, where the decorating will take place at the grave of our late comrade, E. A. Blackman. Having performed this duty the command will march to post hall and be dismissed for dinner, after which the column will be again formed at 1:30 p. m. and marched to place of holding public service as follows: 1st, music by martial band; 2d, prayer; 3d, music by glee club; 4th, oration by our Hon. comrade, B. F. Heckert; 5th, music by the glee club; 6th, exercises by members of the high school class; 7th, remarks by clergy. At the close of these exercises the comrades will fall in line and march to post hall, where they will be dismissed.


