BRITISH LABOR BUSY. Most Were Actively Employed in All Branches of Industry. In the 108 British trades unions, with an aggregate membership of 415,731, making returns to the British board of trade, 14,717, or 3.5 per cent, were reported as unemployed at the end of March, compared with 3.8 per cent in February, and with 4.5 per cent in 83 unions, from which returns were received for March, 1895.
