

THIRTEEN KILLED BY FIRE

The Terrible Result of a Conflagration in Wealthy Homes in the City of New York.

NO OPPORTUNITY GIVEN FOR ESCAPE.

Millionaire Andrews and Eleven Others Perish in His Burning House and One in a Mansion Near By—Suspicious of Incendiarism Are Entertained.

New York, April 8.—The fire which visited the wealthiest section of the city during the early hours of Friday caused the death of 13 persons, and ten others were injured, some probably fatally. The list of dead is almost equally divided between people of unusual wealth and servants. The fire spread so quickly that it gave no chance of escape. The amount of damage done to property is estimated at about \$220,000.

The fire originated at the corner of Sixty-seventh street and Fifth avenue, in the house occupied by Wallace C. Andrews, president of the Steam Heating company.

Fire a Mystery.

There were in the house 14 persons, fast asleep. How the fire originated is still a mystery, though it seems tolerably certain that an explosion of some kind occurred, but whatever was the cause the flames gained hold with such rapidity that only two escaped from the building. One of these is so badly injured that she has no chance of surviving. The fire communicated to Sixty-ninth street, and in the house of Albert J. Adams a servant was burned to death, thus bringing the total of victims to 13. So thoroughly did the flames do their work that when the gutted Andrews house was searched the corpses were so charred as to be almost beyond positive identification.

The names of the dead were ascertained more from certain knowledge of those who were in the house over night than for the traces of the living image that they retained.

On the Third Floor.

Mrs. St. John, her three children and two servants, Kate Downing and Marie Ross, were all on the third floor. Mr. St. John, who is the treasurer of the New York Steam Heating company, and a brother of Mrs. Andrews, was not at home during the fire and had not been notified of his great loss as late as six o'clock in the morning. Mr. Andrews and his wife occupied the middle room on the second floor. There, two hours later, their bodies were found clasped in each other's arms. They were so charred as to be almost beyond recognition.

Jumps to Her Death.

The servants of Andrews were on the fourth, or top floor. Alice White, the cook, leaped from the window to an extension which rose to the third floor. She was found there unconscious by firemen. Jennie Burns, another of the servants, jumped from the same window to the extension. She crushed in her skull and died in the hospital four hours later.

Suspicious of Incendiarism.

Anonymous letters threatening violence to the Andrews family had been received by them as early as January and continuously during the last ten weeks, the last arriving Thursday morning. They demanded the discharge of Mary Flanagan, a chambermaid, with the alternative that the home, family and servants would be endangered. A desire for revenge growing out of a servants' quarrel is believed to have inspired them. Mr. St. John believes the fire and letters are connected.

Memorial Trees Planted.

Columbus, O., April 10.—The trees which are to mark the graves of the confederate dead at Camp Chase, which was used as a prison as well as a station for federal troops, were planted Saturday. A party of ex-confederates, members of their local organization, planted the trees which were marked to show the state from which they came.

Bill Against Lynchers.

Charleston, S. C., April 8.—In the United States circuit court here, Judge W. B. Brawley presiding, a true bill was found by the grand jury against 13 of the men accused of lynching Frazer B. Baker at Lake City, S. C., February 22, 1898.

Twenty-Five Drowned.

Dublin, April 10.—While the yacht Almyth, belonging to Judge Walter Boyd, of the high court of justice in Ireland, was on its way here from Cork it went down with all on board—25 persons.

A Frightful Plunge.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 7.—Terrence Anderson, of Plymouth, who was demented, committed suicide Thursday by jumping down an 800-foot shaft of the Delaware & Hudson mine.

Washington, April 7.—Gen. Weston has assumed command of the commissary department as acting commissary general.

NOT A CANDIDATE.

Admiral Dewey Would Not Under Any Circumstances Consent to a Nomination for President.

New York, April 10.—Admiral Dewey has given to the Manila correspondent of Leslie's Weekly an interview regarding the suggestion that the admiral be made a candidate for the presidency next year. The admiral said, as to his politics:

"I am a sailor. A sailor has no politics. The administration is his party, and republican or democratic, it makes no difference. Then, again, I come from Vermont and you know what that means. To be anything but a republican in Vermont is to be a man without a party. My flag lieutenant comes from Georgia. He tells me that to be anything but a democrat in the south is to be a nobody. If I lived south I would probably be a democrat."

"Have you ever voted?" the correspondent asked.

"Yes, years ago; but my vote was usually influenced by personal preference or local conditions. I am not a politician, have never held political office, and am totally ignorant of party intricacies and affiliations."

Admiral Dewey said that neither by vocation, disposition, education or training was he capacitated to fill the presidency. He said that he was too well along in life to consider such a possibility. His health would not admit it. All his life's work was in different lines of effort, and that while the kindness and enthusiasm of his friends were grateful to him and the generous tributes of the American people were dear to him he could not and would not be a candidate for the presidency of the United States under any conditions.

THE LAST TRIBUTE.

Heroes Who Fell in the War with Spain Are Laid to Rest in Arlington Cemetery.

Washington, April 7.—With full honors of war, upon the crest of the southern slope of Arlington cemetery Thursday afternoon, the nation, represented by President McKinley, his cabinet and other high dignitaries of the government, the commanding general of the army and other distinguished officers, all the regular and militia organizations of the district and a vast concourse of 15,000 people, paid the last tender tribute of honor and respect to the bodies of 336 officers and men who gave their lives on distant battlefields for their country during the Spanish-American war and who are now mustered into the silent army that sleeps in the last bivouac of the brave.

In order to permit all government employes to attend the services all the departments and the federal courts were closed by an executive order of the president and all the flags in the city were half-masted.

Havana, April 7.—All the official flags were half-masted Thursday at the hour of the interment in Arlington cemetery of the 336 soldiers who gave their lives for their country in Cuba or Porto Rico during the war with Spain.

Death of Almon Clapp.

Washington, April 10.—Almon M. Clapp, at one time United States government printer, died at his residence here yesterday in the eighty-eighth year of his age. He established the Aurora (N. Y.) Standard, and later the Buffalo Commercial-Advertiser, and still later the Buffalo Express. He was a delegate to the Pittsburgh convention that founded the republican party, and in 1869 was appointed public printer. On retiring from that office in 1877 he bought an interest in the National Republican of Washington.

Will Hold Us Responsible.

Madrid, April 8.—Prime minister Silvela says he expects to receive the American ratification of the treaty of peace about April 20. Diplomatic relations will then be reestablished with the United States, and Spain will immediately demand from the American government the release of the Spanish prisoners held by the Filipinos, this being provided for in the treaty.

Troops in Cuba.

Washington, April 8.—It was said at the war department that less than 7,000 volunteer United States troops remain in Cuba. The department is availing itself of every resource to get these men out before the rainy season, and the report is that this can be accomplished by the 25th of the present month.

Died of Leprosy.

Junction City, O., April 6.—Hannah Garey, aged 22 years, the older of the two Garey sisters, who have been afflicted with supposed leprosy for the past 17 years, died at their home three miles from here. There is a younger sister, 12 years of age, also suffering from the disease.

Lawton on the Move.

Manila, April 10.—An expedition of 1,500 men and three gunboats, under Gen. Henry W. Lawton, started last night with the intention of crossing Laguna de Bay, capturing the town of Santa Cruz, on the eastern shore of the lake, and then sweeping the country to the south.

Banquet Abandoned.

Chicago, April 10.—The Jefferson day banquet of the Monticello club has been abandoned, owing, it is said, to dissensions over the invitation list, and William J. Bryan, who was to be the chief orator, has been wired not to come.

Burned to Death.

Wakefield, Mass., April 10.—Mrs. John Donahue and Timothy H. Donahue, her son, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their home early Sunday morning.

To Legalize Prize Fights.

Denver, Col., April 7.—Gov. Thomas has signed the bill passed by the general assembly legalizing prize fights when conducted by licensed clubs.

STEPHEN J. FIELD IS DEAD

Noted Legal Authority Succumbs to the Infirmities of Old Age in Washington.

WAS A MEMBER OF A FAMOUS FAMILY.

Served as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court for Thirty-Four Years, the Longest Term in the History of the Tribunal—Sketch of His Career.

Washington, April 10.—Justice Stephen J. Field, of the United States supreme court, retired, died at his home on Capitol hill, in this city, at 6:30 o'clock Sunday evening of kidney complications. About his bedside were his wife and her sister, Mrs. J. Condit Smith, Mr. Justice David J. Brewer, his nephew; Mrs. Edgerton, of California; Mr. Linton, his private secretary; Rev. Edward M. Mott, rector of the Church of the Advent, and the

family servants. He had been unconscious since Saturday morning, and death came painlessly.

Born in Connecticut.

Justice Field was born at Haddam, Conn., on November 4, 1816, but after he was three years old lived for ten years at Stockbridge, Mass., which place has been more prominently identified with the remarkable family of which he was only one of many distinguished members.

His father was Rev. David D. Field, D. D., whose fame filled all New England and who was a pioneer in the religious world of his time. Cyrus W. Field, famous as the projector of the Atlantic cable, David Dudley Field, the eminent lawyer, and Rev. Dr. Henry M. Field, the noted author and religious editor, were his brothers, while their sister was the mother of Justice Brewer.

Mr. Field was a member of California's first state legislature, having been chosen a member of the assembly and of the judiciary committee. He did for California what his brother, David Dudley Field, had already done for New York—namely, framed the laws of the new state.

In 1857, up to which time he enjoyed an extensive law practice, he was elected judge of the supreme court, of which he became chief justice two years later. He was from this position that he ascended to the bench of the supreme court of the United States in 1863.

Narrow Escape from Murder.

Perhaps the most exciting event of Justice Field's life was his narrow escape from the hands of a madman named Perry in the railroad depot at Lathrop, Cal. Justice Field had recently rendered an adverse decision in the celebrated Althea Hill case, by which she was deprived of enjoying the result of Judge Sullivan's decision in the superior court of San Francisco, that decision having established her as the wife of Senator Sharon.

Miss Hill, or Mrs. Sharon, as she called herself after her marriage to Perry, who was the leading counsel in her case. She, with her husband, entered the dining-room at Lathrop, and, seeing Justice Field there, pointed him out to Judge Terry. Terry, who was an intensely partisan man, advanced, at the same time drawing his revolver. Before he had time to use his weapon, however, United States Deputy Marshal Nagle, who had been specially sent to Justice Field's bodyguard, whipped out his revolver and shot Terry dead.

In 1877 Justice Field was one of the 12 members of the commission appointed by congress to conduct an investigation into electoral vote for president. He was one of the seven members who voted that the disputed votes should be cast for Mr. Tilden, the other eight voting for Mr. Hayes, who was accordingly elected.

Retires from the Bench.

Justice Field's retirement from the supreme court bench occurred December 1, 1897, and Attorney-General McKenna, of California, shortly afterwards was nominated to succeed him. He tendered his resignation in April, 1897, to take effect December 1. The president in his letter of acceptance of the resignation wrote:

"Upon your retirement both the bench and the country will sustain a great loss, but the high character and great ability of your work will live and long be remembered not only by your colleagues, but by your grateful fellow countrymen."
