Indian Day.

A very pleasant afternoon was spent at the Coterie, Wednesday afternoon, when Indian day was observed.

The parlors were prettily decorated with Indian pictures and relics, furnished largely by C. H. Engle of Hartford, who gave an interesting talk on Indian customs and work.

Mr. Engle explained the value of the Indian clubs, which are becoming so popular throughout the state, in furthering the industries of the Indians by bringing their goods before the public, thus assisting in creating a market for them. He spoke highly of the unselfish efforts of Chief Pokagon during his entire life, which resulted in the securing from Chicago parties of \$150,000, which fell to the remainder of the tribe of Pottawatamies about the time of his death.

The program, which was opened with a piano solo by Bertha Wise, included a violin solo by Aileen Buskirk and a recitation by Carlos Cole. A vocal duet was rendered by little Misses Stevenson and Grimes, accompanied by Mrs. Welch.

During the roll call which followed, many interesting features of Indian life were recited.
