GRAPE JUICE FACTORY.

New Company Organized to Erect a Mammoth Plant in Paw Paw.

The Malto-Grapo Co., limited, is a new association with \$400,000 permitted capital, just organized for the erection of a grape juice plant in Paw Paw. Following are the officers: Chairman, W. T. Jaquess, Albion; sec'y., Arthur R. Miller, Albion; treas., W. C. Willey, Paw Paw; gen'l mgr., Fred S. Doud, Albion. These gentlemen, with F. E. Morrill of Lawton, constitute the board of managers.

The company expects to have its factory just across the railroad track from the Armour building, and will very soon commence the erection of a factory 60x125 feet. Some stock will be offered on the market, and the first block will be sold at 50 cents, and looks like a first class investment.

The product of the company will be known as Malto-Grapo, an addition of malt to the ordinary grape juice, increasing its medicinal value and adding to its flavor. The formula is a private one, and the product will differ from all others on the market. Prof. Delos Fall, state superintendent of public instruction, will be the chemist of the new association, and the compounding will all be under his direction.

All the board of managers were in town the forepart of the week, attending to preliminary arrangements. Messrs. Miller and Doud expect to become residents of Paw Paw in a very short time.
