J. C. Gould has sold his fine 80 acre fruit farm east of town to Chicago parties for \$7,000 cash, and has bought E. F. Parks' house on Oak street and will move to town.  
Bert Bennett will be employed in R. A. Shoesmith's new store. He is an undertaker and has had experience in the furniture business, making him a good man in a good place.

Mr. Haskins of Chicago, who has purchased Mrs. Haydon's residence in the north-east part of town, has bought through Mrs. Colburn's agency the lot of Eli Wise, immediately east of the house.  
Robert L. Warner, formerly a well-known citizen of this county, is the new editor and manager of the Ann Arbor Daily Times and Courier-Register, which have passed into the possession of a newly organized stock company.

The Courier was printed on The True Northerner press this week. The foundation under Dr. Maynard's building, where the Courier is located, caved into Pugsley & Shepard's new cellar, placing part of the Courier's machinery out of commission.

A team belonging to Sam Orr ran away Tuesday evening. They narrowly missed a number of other vehicles while running through Main street, but fortunately no damage was done except to the carriage, which is now in shape to use in Sam's cook stove.

The contractors for the Malto-Grapo factory suffered a slight loss by fire Saturday morning. Several barrels of lime were stored under the partially completed platform in front of the building. The heavy rain caused the water to run into a hollow under the barrels, slaking the lime and starting a blaze that destroyed the platform. The fire was discovered and extinguished without an alarm being turned in. The loss was about \$50.

J. E. Paulson of Bloomingdale was arraigned before Justice Killefer, Wednesday, charged with violating the local option law. His examination was set for August 10.

The Hartford Day Spring says the people of that town are sore because the Dunkley company does not run its canning factory there to capacity, as was promised when the people donated the site and building at a cost of \$3,500.

Former County Treasurer Hiram K. Wells died suddenly of heart failure at 11 o'clock Monday evening, at his farm in Arlington, where he was spending the summer. The funeral was held at the farm Thursday at 11 a. m. He was born in Algonquin, Ill., December 12, 1843, and came to this county with his parents in 1853. He served three years in the civil war in Co. "C," 3d Mich. Cav. In 1867, he married Miss Caroline Slocum of Arlington, who survives him. For nine years he was supervisor of Arlington township, and was elected county treasurer in 1890, serving four years. After the expiration of his second term he moved to South Haven, where he has since made his home, except such time as he spent on the old farm. Mr. Wells was a much respected citizen, and a man whose loss will be sincerely mourned among a large circle of friends.

A new timetable went into effect on this division of the Pere Marquette, Wednesday morning, and service is now furnished that should be satisfactory to Paw Paw people. A train leaves for Lawton at 6:30 a. m., connecting with the Kalamazoo accommodation west, and returning at 7:10 gets our morning mail here in good season, this same train continuing west to South Haven, where it arrives at 8:30. The first train from the west gets here at 10:25 as of old, leaving for Lawton at 10:50 and connecting with the Central east. This train returns to Paw Paw, arriving at 11:40 and laying here until 1:00 p. m., when it proceeds west to South Haven, connecting at Hartford with the Pere Marquette Chicago train. The passenger arrives here again from the west at 6:00 p. m., continuing immediately to Lawton, connecting with the fast train east, returning here at 6:40 and laying up for the night. We also have a freight which carries passengers, arriving from the west at 11:30 and leaving for Lawton at 1:45, arriving from Lawton at 2:55 and leaving west at 3:50. The only Lawton connections lost over the old S. H. & E. schedule are the evening fast train west and the evening accommodation from Chicago. The Pere Marquette officials have shown their willingness to do all in their power to give us satisfactory service, and will surely reap their just reward in the liberal patronage of the public.

F. A. Brown of Chicago, who was a resident of Paw Paw several years ago, has returned and is considering the purchasing of another farm.


