At a regular meeting of the village council Monday evening it was voted to construct an open well at the water works, of sufficient dimensions to supply the village for all purposes, the present water supply being insufficient. After allowing claims amounting to \$2,054.90 the meeting was adjourned.

Ensign Mrs. Goss of the Salvation Army at Chicago, gave a very interesting talk on her work in the "slums," at the Baptist church Sunday night. Mrs. Goss will remain over another week, thus gaining a needed rest. A number expressed the desire to assist by an offering in this work. The various summer resorts are lively places these days. The improved Lake Cora hotel is enjoying a good patronage. Have our people lost all interest in the Paw Paw Board of Trade? A meeting was called for last week Wednesday evening, but only a very few of the stockholders appeared, and no business was transacted, an adjournment being taken for one week. No one at all appeared at the adjourned meeting. The immediate object of the meeting was to consider a proposition for a write-up of Paw Paw in the Sunday Inter Ocean. In response to a request for such a write-up, Mr. Weatherly was sent here by the Inter Ocean to make arrangements for the business, and was in all fairness entitled to a decision, either favorable or unfavorable, by a vote of the Board of Trade. Not only this, but the current expenses of the Board of Trade for a long time past have not been met. The secretary has paid out considerable postage and other items and the president has paid his own expenses on work of the organization, and there are a number of unpaid local bills that should be attended to. The Board of Trade members should awake from their lethargy, attend the meetings and do what they can to advance the interests of the town; or else, if the organization has outlived its usefulness, the members should get together, pay an assessment sufficient to pay all indebtedness, and then disband square with the world.


