H. E. Speyer, general manager of the Indestructible Post company, together with O. Otterson, master mechanic, and James Asher, superintendent of the Chicago Heights factory, are here now setting the machinery for the Paw Paw factory and with no unexpected delays the Paw Paw plant will be in full operation October 15, 1904.

"What is the matter with fruit prices in this locality?" is a question heard frequently. The following letter from a wholesale fruit house in the West, one of many similar ones received by W. C. Wildey, will shed some light on the situation: "We have your wire of the 28th, and it is impossible for us to use the Michigan grapes at the price you mention. We can buy grapes in New York, pay the difference in freight and deliver them here for less money than the Michigan grapes, for the reason that they can be bought cheaper in the first place, and the icing charge will only figure one-half as much."

The October term of the circuit court will convene next Monday. There are 15 criminal cases on the calendar, against the following parties: Louis Unrath, statutory rape; John Jones, sodomy; John Rooney, violation local option law; Clyde Stanley, larceny; Herbert Simpson, assault and battery; Charles Allison, felonious assault; Benj. Leighton, violation liquor law; Julius Winkel, assault with intent to murder; Clare Edgell, violation local option law. There are 22 issues of fact—jury, and 6 issues of fact—non-jury; 40 first class and 16 fourth class chancery—a total of 90 cases, an unusually heavy calendar. Of the 55 chancery cases, 34 are for divorce.
