Merriman of Hartford has been appointed by the governor as a member of the Jackson prison board to succeed Dr. W. H. Bills of Allegan, and Mr. Merriman was accorded the honor of immediate confirmation by the senate in open session. Taylor's art studio and barber shop are now owned by the Taylor brothers, Don Taylor having purchased a half interest in both. Roy will have charge of the barber shop while Don manages the studio, and both places will be run in the same old up-to-date way. The republican committee of the 30th judicial circuit composed of the counties of Cass and Van Buren, met in Decatur and decided to hold the judicial convention in Lawton, Thursday, February 23, at one o'clock p. m. Senator Jason Woodman was selected as temporary chairman. Under a resolution passed by the last judicial convention held in Lawton six years ago, each county will be entitled to 14 delegates. The Van Buren county representatives on the committee were not satisfied with this arrangement and accordingly the motion was made and carried by a unanimous vote, that the judicial committee recommend to the convention assembled in response to this call, that before the work of nominating a circuit judge is taken up the number of delegates to the convention be re-apportioned. Under the apportionment in the state convention Van Buren is entitled to 14 votes and Cass 11.—Decatur Republican.

Circuit Court.

William Culver vs. the South Haven & Eastern Railroad company; on trial. This is an action on the case to recover damages for the loss of both feet occasioned by the plaintiff's being run over by a freight car in this village some three years ago. Culver was an employe of the road and alleges that the accident was caused by the negligence of the defendant. This is the third trial of the case. The first trial, in February, 1903, resulted in a verdict against the railroad for \$10,000. The court, on motion of the defendant, granted a new trial, which was had the next October, the plaintiff gaining a verdict of \$15,000. The case was appealed to the supreme court, reversed and sent back for a new trial. Messrs. Tabor of Lawton and Cavanaugh of Paw Paw appear for Culver; Messrs. Maher of Chicago, Bridgman of Benton Harbor, Barnard of Paw Paw and Lawton of Lawton for the railroad.

SAID HE TRIED TO FREEZE HER.

Allegations Made in a Petition for Divorce.—Wife Also Com.plaints of Violence.

Battle Creek, Mich., Jan. 24. — A rather interesting divorce case has been commenced here by Mrs. Julia Foote-Johnson against her husband, Jerome Johnson, a well-known insurance and pension agent. The complaint alleges extreme cruelty, Mrs. Johnson declaring that her well-to-do husband turned off the water, gas, etc., in her house and furnished no fuel for her warmth. She also alleges violence, and a bunch of policemen will be sworn as having been sent to the Johnson residence, a beautiful home, in a patrol wagon, to quell a family riot. Mrs. Johnson comes from one of the best families here. She was formerly Mrs. Julia Foote, a well-known public school teacher, while her husband was a widower, supposed to be well off financially. His first wife was very prominent in local musical circles before her death only a few years ago. Johnson claims the case has two sides.

Will Be a Good Market for Ore.
