## A Juvenile Court.

A meeting, the initiatory step in what may result in the establishment of a juvenile court law in the state of Michigan, is being held in Kalamazoo to-day. Those at the conference are members of the legislative committee of the Michigan Conference of Corrections and Charities and are W. A. Prater of Paw Paw, chairman; C. A. Merrill, Kalamazoo; H. A. Whitney, Battle Creek; L. C. Smith, Allegan; Rev. Caroline Bartlett Crane, Kalamazoo, and James F. Hill of Detroit.

The object of the meeting is to draft a bill to be presented to the state legislature looking to the passage and adoption of a juvenile court law in Michigan and the establishment of juvenile courts in the various counties of the state. It is not the intention to eliminate any of the safeguards that now surround the juvenile offenders of the state, but simply to add this feature to the many others now in existence.

The advantage of a juvenile court is most important, as it tends to separate all cases of waywardness on the part of the young from the regular criminal docket, thus eliminating the stigma that is attached to the misdeeds of young boys and girls and that are likely to follow them through life and come up at the most inopportune moment. Another advantage of the juvenile court is that it gives to juvenile offenders the privilege of the probation law that now exists, but applies to adults.

While the matter is still in abeyance it is the desire of the committee to have special juvenile courts established in all counties of 50,000 inhabitants or over, while in those counties containing less than 50,000 population the judge of probate is to be empowered to act in the capacity of judge of the juvenile court. It is pointed out that probate court proceedings are never of a criminal nature and that in consequence an erring child can be taken before that court with better grace than before a judge or justice who is forced to handle criminal cases.—Kalamazoo Telegraph, Tuesday, Feb. 8.
