D. 1910, pass and adopt an ordinance, subject to the approval of the electors of said township, as provided by law, granting unto The Chicago, Michigan & Indiana Electric Railways Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the state of Michigan, its successors and assigns, permission and authority, and a right of way to locate, establish, construct, use and maintain, own and operate, a railway by electricity, or other power approved (except steam), with all appurtenances thereunto belonging, on, in, through and over the streets and highways in said township of Paw Paw, as in and by said franchise specified.

Therefore, Resolved, By The Township Board of the township of Paw Paw, that the said ordinance and franchise be submitted for approval to the electors of the said township of Paw Paw, at its regular election to be held on the 4th day of April, A. D. 1910, by ballot, to-wit:

Confirming grant of franchise to The Chicago, Michigan & Indiana Electric Railways Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the state of Michigan, its successors and assigns, authority and a right to locate, establish, construct, use, maintain, own and operate a railway by electricity, across and over the highways of the township of Paw Paw, as provided in and by an ordinance heretofore passed by the Township Board of said township of Paw Paw.

Therefore, Resolved, By The Township Board of the township of Paw Paw that the said ordinance and franchise be submitted for approval to the electors of said township of Paw Paw, at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of April, A. D., 1910, by ballot, to-wit:

Confirming grant of franchise to Wm. C. Plumb and H. H. Tucker, and to their successors and assigns, and to any company or corporation succeeding to their rights and privileges, under the provisions of this franchise, the right to locate, establish, construct, extend, use, maintain, own and operate a street or interurban railway by electricity, or by such other power as shall be approved by the Township Board of said township of Paw Paw, together with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging, and all necessary convenient tracks, turn-outs, side-tracks, spurs and switches, and with single or double trolley wire, with necessary poles and overhead wires and rail connections, and to operate and maintain thereon cars necessary and convenient for the transaction of their business, to-wit: Transportation of passengers, baggage, freight, express, and other commodities usually carried by such railways, together with the United States mails.

Election Notice.

PROPOSITIONS

Also for the purpose of voting upon the following propositions viz.:

To amend section 12 of article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Michigan, relative to bonded indebtedness of counties, as provided by concurrent resolution No. 4 legislative session of 1909.

To nominate by direct vote by every political party candidates for circuit judge for the judicial circuit of which this voting precinct forms a part. Each political party shall vote separately upon said proposition.

In accordance with the constitution of the state of Michigan and act 206 public acts of 1909, should there be any proposition or propositions to vote upon at said election involving the direct expenditure of public money or the issue of bonds, every woman who possesses the qualifications of male electors and owns property assessed for taxes or owns property subject to taxation jointly with her husband, or with any other person, or who owns property on contract and pays taxes thereon, all such property being located in said township, will be entitled to vote upon such propositions, provided such person has had her name duly registered in accordance with the provisions of said act.

The polls of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day of election, unless the board of election inspectors shall in their discretion adjourn the polls at

12 o'clock noon for one hour.

Registration Notice.

WOMEN ELECTORS

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with sec. 4, article 3, of the constitution of the state of Michigan and act number 206 of the public acts of 1909, the board of registration of the township of Paw Paw, county of Van Buren, state of Michigan at the next ensuing meeting thereof, to be held at the Bennett & Lake furniture store, within said township, on:

Saturday April 2 1910

will register the names of all women possessing the qualifications of male electors who make personal application for such registration provided, that all such applicants must own property assessed for taxes somewhere within said county of Van Buren except that any women otherwise qualified who own property within said county jointly with her husband or other person, or who owns property within said county on contract and pays taxes thereon, shall be entitled to register. Following are the qualifications of male electors in the state of Michigan:

Every male inhabitant of this state being a citizen of the United States; every male inhabitant residing in this state on the twenty-fourth day of June, eighteen hundred thirty-five; every male inhabitant residing in this state on the first day of January eighteen hundred fifty; every male inhabitant of foreign birth who, having resided in this state two years and six months prior to the eighth day of November, eighteen hundred ninety-four; and having declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States two years and six months prior to said last named day and every civilized male inhabitant of Indian descent, a native of the United States and not a member of any tribe, shall be an elector and entitled to vote; but no one shall be an elector or entitled to vote at any election unless he shall be above the age of twenty-one years and has resided in this state six months and in the township or ward in which he offers to vote twenty days nextpreceeding such election.

Said board of Registration will be in session on the day and at the place aforesaid from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose aforesaid.
