PRIMARY ENROLLMENT.

In accordance with Act No. 281, Public Acts of 1909, a General Primary Election will be held in every voting precinct in Michigan on Tuesday, September 6, 1910. No person is entitled to vote at any primary election in the state of Michigan unless duly enrolled, but it shall NOT be necessary for electors enrolled under previous acts to enroll under said Act No. 281. Section 4 of said Act No. 281 fixes the first Monday in April preceding the September primary as the date of such enrollment, and Section 8 of said Act indicates that personal application shall be necessary to secure such enrollment, and Section 10 provides that only in case of sickness or unavoidable absence from the election precinct on enrollment day can an elector secure enrollment and be entitled to vote at the September primary, except that a person who may have become 21 years of age, or a qualified elector after enrollment day, can have his name enrolled on primary election day.

In accordance with above, Notice is hereby given that the Enrollment Board of the township of Paw Paw, county of Van Buren, state of Michigan, will be in session at Longwell's opera house, the voting place for said township, on Monday, April 4, A. D. 1910, from 7 o'clock a. m. until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day, for the purpose of enrolling the names of all legal voters, members of whatever political party, who may make personal application, for such enrollment.

Any person duly enrolled who has changed his residence to another election precinct may be enrolled in the new precinct and vote therein, provided he has resided in the new precinct 20 days, and obtain from a member of the enrollment board of the precinct where he formerly resided a certificate stating that he was duly enrolled in such precinct, and is entitled to enrollment in the new precinct.
