**Hat Off to the Day Spring.**

The True Northerner bows in humble submission to the opinion of the Hartford Day Spring and deputy attorney general of the State of Michigan.

Some time ago, the True Northerner took issue with our friend the Day Spring on the question of the legal right of women in the townships to vote on the granting of an electric railway franchise. It was our contention that the constitution of the state gave women in the townships the same right to vote on this question that it did in the villages. That any other construction would be unfair and unjust. The Day Spring thought otherwise, and last week published an opinion from the deputy attorney general sustaining its contention.

The True Northerner still maintains and believes that the supreme court would affirm our decision, and in this opinion we are upheld by some of the leading attorneys of the county. But in the absence of a ruling from the higher tribunal, we will take off our hats and bow to the ruling of our esteemed contemporary, and the deputy attorney general.

THE "dry" victory at the polls last Monday was a substantial one. The vote was practically all out and there can now be no doubt of the sentiment of the majority of the people of Van Buren county on this question. By their verdict they have placed their seal of approval on the new drug law, which went into effect last September, and have also demonstrated in emphatic terms that saloons are not wanted in Van Buren county. It will probably be many years before the same question is brought up in this county again.

THE P. H. Kelley nominating petitions were circulated on election day. Practically every one that was asked was willing and anxious to sign the same. Two hundred and seventy six names were signed to the petition in Paw Paw township, and as many more could have been added, if it had been possible to see them all. Everybody in this "neck of the woods" is for "Pat" for governor.

THE enrollment board was kept busy last Monday enrolling the names of new voters and those who desired to change their politics. There were 100 names enrolled as republicans, 25 democrats and 5 independent. Nine who had previously enrolled as democrats, re-enrolled as republicans. It won't be long before there will be no democrats.

THE annual convention of the state league of republican clubs will be held in the city of Lansing on Wednesday April 27 at 2 p. m. The 13th annual banquet of the Zach Chandler club will be held in the evening of the same day. Hon. Sam H. Kelley secretary of the state R. R. Commission is president of the league.

THE next circuit judge of the 36th, judicial circuit will be nominated by the primary system. There was practically no opposition to the proposition in Van Buren county, and it carried by an overwhelming majority. It also carried by a safe margin in Cass county.

HEAVY frost Wednesday night but not much damage done. Grape grower are trembling in their boots, for fear the early spring will be disastrous to the grape crop.
