by Automobile and Pain-
fully Injured.

Master Meri Heller was the victim of a serious accident last Monday. He with three other playmates were in the road in front of the Mrs. Rose Smith residence picking up the pieces of ice that had been scattered by the ice wagon. Miss Dorothy Hall was driving her father's seven passenger Studebaker at a moderate speed. The boys, on seeing the machine, separated, one going in one direction and the other two in the opposite way. Dorothy turned the machine so as to avoid the two boys and in doing so struck the Heller boy knocking him to the ground, fracturing his collar bone, also the bone in the arm. The little fellow was picked up and taken to his home and Dr. Jackson was called and set the fractured bones and Meri was made as comfortable as possible. As far as we can learn no blame is attached to Dorothy. It seemed to be one of the inevitables. If the boys had all run in the same direction the accident would not have occurred. The injured boy and his parents have the sympathy of all as such accidents are all lamentable.

SHERIFF BEATTIE SOME MARKSMAN

He drew his Colt's revolver, and as the machine was speeding away from him, put a bullet through one of the rear tires. The driver then stopped the car and the occupants were taken to the jail. They proved to be four Bay City boys, all members of prominent families, who were on their way to the Pacific coast. The sheriff from Kalamazoo arrived about 3:00 a. m. and took the quartet to Kalamazoo, where they were bound over to the circuit court for trial.
