

COURT CONVENES ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 18

The October term of the Circuit court will be in session Monday, October 18. The calendar is on the press of The True Northerner and contains 104 cases. There are 17 criminal, 22 issue fact jury, 5 issue of fact—non-jury, 34 chancery first class, 26 chancery fourth class. There are 11 contested divorce cases, and 20 are perfectly contented if the complainant secures his or her divorce. In the 32 divorce cases the husband is the complainant in 13 and the wife in 19.
