CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS

MANY CHANCERY CASES DIS-
POSED OF; CRIMINAL CAL-
ENDAR ON TRIAL.

The case of John S. Stephens vs. Fred J. Johnson, accounting was taken under advisement by the court.
The First State bank of Marcellus vs. Julia H. Fletcher, foreclosure. Decree entered in favor of complainant in sum of \$4900.

Divorce Granted.
The divorce case of Mae Crippen vs. Edward Crippen, was heard by the court and decree entered granting divorce and giving the custody of the two children to the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Crippen. The complainant alleges cruelty and is the outcome of the criminal case, wherein her husband cut her with a knife, and who is now serving a term in Jackson prison.

Bowerman vs. Bowerman.
The case of Effie D. Bowerman vs. Charles Bowerman, divorce. Decree granted and complainant was given \$100 alimony. The bill of complaint alleges that Effie Bowerman, late of Decatur township, married Charles Bowerman on November 19, 1896, and they lived together until April 9, 1913; that six children were born to them; that Charlie afterwards abandoned and deserted her for upwards of two years without reasonable cause; that he repeatedly stated he did not love her and wanted her to leave him; that he utterly refused to provide her with money, food or clothing. The court granted her request for separation. The custody of four of the children was awarded to the father.

Gailhouse vs. Gailhouse.
A decree of divorce was granted to Charles Gailhouse from his wife, Lena Gailhouse. The parties to this case are residents of Decatur township and were married in Paw Paw by Justice Killefer, September 6, 1906, and lived together until the 11th day of May, 1914. Three children were born to them, whose ages range from 3 to 7 years. The bill of complaint alleges that on or about May 11 she went to live with Frank Smith of Decatur, and took her family of children to the new home; that she has lived with Smith ever since except for three weeks, when she returned to her husband February 18, 1915, and again returned to Smith on March 10, and she is living with Smith against the protest of her husband. The court granted the complainant's plea for separation from Lena. Attorney Walter Jones of Marcellus, represented the complainant.

People vs. Prehn.
The case of the people vs. Don Prehn occupied the court's attention Monday and part of Tuesday. This is a Lawton case, whereby the complainant, Hester Smith, accuses Don Prehn with being the father of her child. The evidence showed that she lived the past eight or nine years in the same neighborhood with Prehn, and became acquainted and intimate with him; that she left the home of her father, Wm. Smith, in July, 1914, and went to live with Mary Prehn until the latter part of November. She became intimate with Prehn in July and on the 9th day of June, 1915, gave birth to her child. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty.

People vs. Whipple.
The case of the people vs. Ralph Whipple, assault with intent to murder, was begun on Tuesday and went to the jury on Wednesday night. After being out a few hours, the jury returned a verdict of assault and battery. This is the case from Almena which was mentioned in The True Northerner some time ago. The case is the outgrowth of son-in-law and mother-in-law differences.

People vs. Ward Foster.
The case of the people vs. Ward Foster, wife abandonment, came to trial Thursday and the jury is out as we go to press.

People vs. Kominski.
This case is set for hearing today (Friday). This is the case from Geneva township wherein the defendant is charged with using a knife on a man named Davis, a railroad mail clerk.

Frederick Hotrum, an old resident of Paw Paw, died at the home of his son Charlie, on Wednesday morning, aged 62 years, 4 months, 1 day. He was born in Canada, and came to Michigan when a young man.
The funeral will be held from the Poe church in Cass County on Friday, October 29. Burial in Poe cemetery.

BIG BARN CAUGHT FIRE FROM ENGINE

The large stock barn of Sylvester Hamilton, southwest of Paw Paw, burned to the ground with nearly all of its contents, Tuesday noon.
Mr. Hamilton had a large number of men working filling a silo. A traction engine was employed, and it is supposed that a spark from the engine was the cause of the fire.
There were eight head of horses in the barn, and all were saved, one however, was badly burned. Between 35 and 40 tons of hay, and a quantity of grain, and most all of the farming tools, harness, etc., were lost.
The fire occurred during the dinner hour, and when first discovered was coming from the roof of the hay and stock barn. The loss is between \$3500 and \$4000.
Mr. Hamilton carried \$3000 insurance with the Cass Mutual of Dowagiac.

THREATENED TO SHOOT HIS WIFE

Paul McKee of Grand Junction, was arrested and brought to Paw Paw Saturday by Deputy Sheriff Fred Renshaw, charged with having threatened to shoot his wife. Arrangements had been previously made before his examination Monday to have Paul plead guilty to just a simple assault, and he was taken to Grand Junction before Justice Fred Reams for that purpose. Upon reaching the justice office he had a change of heart, and pleaded not guilty, which came as a surprise to the officers, and he demanded an examination. As Prosecutor Burhans is busy in circuit court, Paul will have to wait for his examination, and can prepare for a more severe examination than was first intended.

No date has been set for the examination.

Talk to Waters For the "1900" Gravity Washer



The bottom of the tub is provided with slat paddles.
There is a round disk, or agitator, with 28 round holes, and rows of slat paddles, that sets down over the clothes to be washed.
This round, wooden disk is held firmly in position and kept from moving up or down, or turning around with the tub, by metal arms reaching out from both sides of the top of the framework of the washer, which are fastened to the disk by means of a lever lock.
