Aged Lady Crowded from Sidewalk. Shoulder Dislocated and Bones Fractured.

Some careless boy or man on a bicycle was the cause of a serious injury to Mrs. Harriet Douglas last Thursday night. She was on her way to prayer meeting, when some unknown bicycle rider came up behind her on the sidewalk and attempted to pass. It was quite dark and she was so startled that she lost her balance and fell. Her shoulder was dislocated and the bones cracked. Owing to her advanced age the accident is a serious one and her condition is critical. The rider did not stop to see what damage he had done, but rode rapidly down the walk on east Main street and his identity is unknown.

It is miraculous that accidents of a similar nature have not occurred before. Some bicycle riders have long ridden on the sidewalk with utter disregard of the rights of pedestrians. It is now time to see that the ordinance regarding bicycle riders is enforced and that careless riders no longer infringe upon the rights of old ladies and children with impunity.
