### MICHIGAN NEWS ITEMS IN BRIEF

Paragraphs of interest to Wolverine State Readers.

News of All Kinds Gathered From Various Points in the State and So Reduced in Size That it Will Appeal to All Classes of Readers.

Mrs. A. J. Stephens, of Prescott, pioneer of that place, is dead of pneumonia.

William E. Bosley, aged 79, former mayor of Marshall and a former member of the legislature, is dead.

Despondency and 2 ounces of acid spelled eternity for Isaac Williams, fifty-five years old of New Troy.

Charles Palmer, founder of Inlay City, is dead at his home. He was born at Stillwater, N. Y., in 1831.

J. Madison, former Ionia grocer, was sentenced to serve from three to five years in Ionia prison for bigamy.

Muskegon will begin food inspection June 1, with Dr. J. A. McCreevy, of Chicago, appointed local inspector.

Lois Larsen, one of Kalamazoo's most prominent business men, was found dead in a hotel room where he had shot himself.

The recent Ingham county election cost the wet side \$13,211, according to their expense account filed with the county clerk at Mason.

Steve Shott, of near Fairgrove, died from injuries he received when attacked by a vicious horse. The animal trampled on him, crushing his chest.

Mrs. E. Steerard, of Kalamazoo, who was separated from her husband five years ago, confessed to poisoning a babe born to her three months ago.

While demented, Mrs. Nellie Barry, of Clio, an inmate of the homeopathic hospital, wandered into the Huron river, but was rescued before drowning.

Harold Wilson, student from Sault Ste. Marie, was elected editor-in-chief of the Albion college paper, the Pleiad, and Gerald Stedman, of Detroit, business manager.

A. Everett, of Ypsilanti, committed suicide by drinking poison in front of the residence of his father-in-law, Romaine Lawrence, where his wife was watching him from a window.

Mrs. Charlotte Bennett, of near Eaton Rapids, Eaton township's oldest pioneer resident, aged eighty-nine years, was seriously injured by a fall at her home. She will recover.

Nathaniel H. Space, pioneer of Eaton county, and a veteran of the civil war, is dead at his home in Delta township, aged seventy-three years. He was prominent in G. A. R. circles.

Adjutant General Bersey of the National Guard received word from the war department that the two batteries of artillery in Lansing would not go to Tobyhanna, Pa., for their summer encampment.

Nelson McClintic, Mason youth who swore falsely in a blind tiger case, was found guilty of perjury by a jury and immediately sentenced to the Jackson prison to serve from two to fifteen years.

Mrs. Vilma George, a Pontiac woman, recently divorced from H. George, of Pontiac, is now Countess von Kaunitz, having been married to Count Sigmond Raymond von Kaunitz in New York.

A chess game by a club in Gladstone and a similar organization in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, is progressing slowly through the mails owing to the strict censorship on the part of the Canadian Government.

Prosecutions for obtaining money under false and fraudulent pretenses were ordered by Governor Ferris in the alleged fraudulent tax roll investigations against the Lake Breeze Land company, of Presque Isle county.

After operating 50 years as a great lumber cutting mill in northern Michigan, the immense Filer & Sons double-band saw and shingle mill has been sold to M. Brandy & Sons, salvage and wrecking contractors, of Grand Rapids.

A haste to reach her home ahead of an approaching rain storm, caused the death of Mrs. Emma Hart, aged sixty-seven years, of Berrien Springs. She died of heart failure on the doorstep of her home within the sight of her two brothers.

Girls won in the district oratorical contest in St. Joseph. First honors went to Miss Anna De Haan, of Zealand, and Miss Almee Renkes, of Hastings. Oscar Bennett of Hartford, and Donald Bushnell, of St. Joseph, took second prizes.

Owls have killed and are killing more partridges in the upper peninsula woods during this season than all hunters and woodsmen who shot the birds out of season, according to trappers who have returned after a season north of Escanaba.

Wm. Hookstra, Grand Rapids, a carpenter, attempted to murder Reverend Johannes Groen, pastor of the Eastern Avenue Christian Reformed church, and president of the Grand Rapids Ministerial association. He was later sent to the Kalamazoo insane asylum.

Senior students of the engineering college of the University of Michigan face a suit as a result of the action of Mrs. M. M. Root, proprietor of a local music store, who says that the students are infringing on her copyrights of several Michigan songs, among them "The Yellow and the Blue," in a song book which has just been issued by the class.

Grand Rapids has arranged to have a big preparedness parade on Decoration day.

Geo. Dumouchel, Menominee, 23 years old, fell from a coal crane and broke his right leg.

H. B. Grider, Pomona farmer, of near Cadillac, suffered a broken jaw when struck by a falling limb.

Menominee reports one suicide, five broken legs, one eye blinded as the total of happenings of one day.

Louis Premo, 59, of Menominee, lost the sight of one eye when a piece of wood he was sawing flew into the optic.

A man, supposed to be Don Griffin, plasterer, of Findlay, O., was killed by northbound passenger train No. 310, near Monroe.

Mrs. Hannah Anderson, aged 69, pioneer resident of Hastings, is dead as the result of a fall in which she broke her hip ten days ago.

D. Turrill, who escaped Ionia a short time ago by jumping from a second story window, was captured on the peninsula at Traverse City.

Levi Morningstar, of Saginaw, is reported an heir to the estate of the late Jacob Baker, of Philadelphia, said to be worth \$700,000,000.

E. J. Ellis, Jackson, former clerk of Jackson county and a lifelong resident, ended his life by swallowing carbolic acid and inhaling gas at his home.

Ernest Ross, living at Cadillac, engineer on the Ann Arbor railroad, fell from his cab at Harrietta and suffered a broken arm and other injuries.

While wading in shallow water, at Hastings, the ten-year-old son of Chester Granger, fell in a fit. He died an hour after being rescued by his father.

Mrs. Adeline T. Chambers, who resides near the Allegan-Ottawa county line, has just celebrated her one hundred and third birthday anniversary.

Cadillac Board of Trade has opened a campaign to increase its membership and to engage a secretary who will give all his time to the interests of the city.

Arthur Clark, farmer living at Ludington, narrowly escaped death when a package of dynamite caps in his coat pocket exploded. His unusually heavy clothing saved his life.

Florence Hairurda, a Grand Rapids girl, thought Nick Van Derlaan a Polish lued enemy when he was working at her home and emptied a pail of ice water on his head.

After being out three hours, the jury at Marshall in the Hastings-Horton \$5,000 damage suit, in which Miss Hazel Hastings accused her employer's wife, Mrs. Hazen A. Horton, of slandering her, disagreed.

Ezra Levins, in charge of the agricultural department of the Kalamazoo public schools, and John Bursma, a student, were seriously hurt when an automobile driven by Levins went into a ditch near Kalamazoo.

Ethel Pearce, a nurse who disappeared from her home two weeks ago, wandered into St. Mary's hospital, at Marquette, dazed and unable to tell where she had been or what she had done in her absence.

After keeping her wedding a secret from her friends for two weeks, Miss Gussie Woodruff, popular Cadillac girl, told friends that she had been married to George Morse, son of a Grand Rapids furniture dealer, in Grand Rapids.

Mrs. Mary Gates, a Sault Ste. Marie woman, quarreled with Dan Ferro, an Italian ex-convict, and afterward as she passed where he was working he beat her unconscious with a shovel. Mrs. Gates lost half her face and part of her scalp.

Henry Spencer, of Menominee, while superintending the clearing of some land was struck by a log which was drawn by horses. He rode on a stoneboat across a forty acre farm to his automobile, cranked it and ran it to the city. His right leg was fractured.

Declaring that A. J. Winslow, the well-known and eccentric Kalamazoo capitalist who jumped to his death a few weeks ago from a window in Borgess hospital, was not in his right mind when he drew his will, relatives have protested the probating of the document.

Michigan is up against a "paper famine." The state printer has no paper upon which to print the compiled laws and other books which should be issued and the manufacturers, it is said, refuse to ship paper, although it was contracted for in advance almost a year ago.

In court at Mason Reverend Hiram Vothies, former pastor of the Locke township Free Methodist church, confessed to slandering Miss Cecil Cobb, when he agreed to the entering of a judgment of six cents in the \$10,000 damage suit which had been brought against him.

G. A. Woodford, Menominee, 67 years old, cranked his own automobile in the garage when the self-starter failed. The machine, in gear, moved forward, crushing Woodford against the wall. Both legs were broken, and other injuries may cause fatal results.

Three years ago, Arthur Stephenson, a Bay City young man, was run into by an automobile and his left leg below the knee was crushed. The leg, continuing to give trouble, has just been amputated below the knee and two rusty shingle nails were drawn from the bone of the amputated portion.

E. K. Converse, of Menominee, aged 29, head of the business department of the high school, was knocked from his bicycle by an auto. The machine dragged Converse along the pavement, breaking his leg and injuring his back. Converse is in the hospital opposite a seven year old son just operated on for appendicitis.
