MICHIGAN NEWS ITEMS IN BRIEF

Paragraphs of interest to Wolverine State Readers.

News of All Kinds Gathered From Various Points in the State and So Reduced in Size That it Will Appeal to All Classes of Readers.

Arthur Hillier fell dead on the street at Port Huron.

The Eighth Michigan Infantry will hold its annual reunion in Flint on June 16.

C. W. Root, who was active in political and fraternal life of Lansing for forty years, is dead at his home.

William Sharp, aged 88, Howell, a veteran of Michigan's "Fighting Fifth," of civil war fame, was buried there.

Neil McDougall's skull was fractured when the automobile in which he was riding rolled into a ditch near Frankenthuth.

Tom Kurec, an Iron River workman, was smothered to death in the Tully mine by a slide of several tons of rock down a chute in which he was working.

April figures in Benton Harbor show the factory pay roll was upwards of \$30,000 above April of last year. Nearly 500 more laborers were given employment.

Wilfred Scott, a Gladstone laborer, was smothered to death when ashes covered him in a boiler room. The body was found by men hauling the ashes away.

Mrs. Warren Waite, of Grand Rapids, mother of Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, is seriously ill at her home and friends say she is dying of a broken heart.

M. Friedman & Co., a Grand Rapids firm, has purchased the Spring Dry Goods company, and the Friedman store and the Spring store are being merged.

Joe Cahayauska, an Indian, enlisted at Muskegon. "I want to see service in Mexico," he declared when asked why he joined.

Alex. Smith, of Kalamazoo, a former clerk in the Bushler meat market, was caught early in the morning, according to the police, while attempting to rob the safe in the market.

After a dispute with his wife at home in Ottawa county, John Bink, aged thirty-eight years, shot himself in the temple, while his wife and three children stood by.

When an unidentified young woman grew nervous and lost the control of a Ford automobile she was driving, just east of Ypsilanti, it rolled over in a ditch, injuring all the passengers, three young men and three girls.

With a bullet fired through his brain and a revolver clutched in one hand, the body of William Smurr, of Portland, was found lying in the roadside, a mile from the city early in the morning by a former neighbor.

Dennis Morgan, former slave, said to have been more than 100 years old, died in the Handy A. M. E. home. Morgan had resided in Jackson for more than 50 years. When the civil war broke out he had seven grown sons.

At a social meeting of the Theta Beta sorority of Ionia young ladies, Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Dolson announced the marriage in June of their daughter, Abbie Louise, to Victor D. Carlisle, both Ionia high graduates.

Human bones of a Detroit man who murdered his child and then went to Jackson county and killed himself seventy-five years ago, were unearthed by Frank Benn, a farmer, while plowing in a 15-acre field on the Anson Townley farm in Tompkins township.

Rt. Rev. Melchir Faust, for several years missionary director of the Catholic Indian reservation of Baraga county, died suddenly. He was sixty-eight years old and was the holder of the Iron Cross for bravery displayed while serving with the German army in the Franco-Prussian war.

Judge Lamb sitting at Cadillac has filed decree declaring Wexford county Socialist party the legal beneficiary of the estate of the late James Wellwood, Missaukee farmer, whose will provided that \$500 of his estate should go to the "Striking miners of Colorado" and the remainder to Wexford Socialists.

Anna McCauley, 80, an inmate of Shiawassee county poor house for forty-three years, who insisted that she was the daughter of a former supreme justice of Michigan, is dead. A son, William Townsend, has been a county charge for thirty-one years. He went to the poorhouse when he was twelve years old.

The rate law will cost Hillsdale county about \$1,000 a year. So far 1916 County Treasurer Chesnut has paid orders amounting to \$551.63. After the law went into effect he paid \$188 for 1915. This makes \$539 that has been paid out in less than nine months. During the present month, May, he has paid out \$161.40.

Mrs. Eva Steenard, Kalamazoo infanticide, at her own request held a long interview with Judge George Welmer relative to the charge that she had killed her baby. Judge Welmer announced after the interview that he would not accept a plea of guilty from the woman and that he would order a trial.

The Women's relief corps of Ypsilanti has presented a flag to the Second Baptist church.

S. Ryan, Bay City, unmarried, who was struck by an automobile May 16, died in Mercy hospital.

E. R. Gilbert, 83, of near Dowagiac the last member of Cass county's oldest pioneer family, died of old age.

Lena, eleven-year-old daughter of Frank Yahn, of Salszburg, was killed by a Michigan Central passenger train.

M. Dubina, storekeeper in Albion's big foreign settlement, was arraigned in justice court on a charge of selling liquor.

Albion seniors, 50 strong, celebrated "sneak day" by cutting all classes and spending the day at Vandervook's near Jackson.

Jno. Schipper, Zeeland furniture factory, received serious internal injuries when he was caught between a belt and pulley.

Julius J. Wells, 84, pioneer lumberman and builder of mills, is dead at the home of his daughter at Flint of pneumonia.

A Benton Harbor pioneer, Sylvester Warner, aged seventy-one years, for years a leading contractor, has succumbed after a long illness.

The body of John Hill, employed in a lumber camp near Cadillac, was found mangled on the Grand Rapids & Indiana railway company's tracks.

William McDaniels, fifty-four years of age, of Grand Ledge, died at Lansing hospital. He was employed by the Pere Marquette nearly forty years.

Burglars at Escanaba Mich., entered the home of Mrs. Kate Aspinwall, wealthy widow, drugged her and stole heirlooms and certificates of deposit valued at nearly \$7,000.

Benton Harbor graduates of high school have ruled against any girl with the celebration of the fortieth commencement spending more than \$5 for her graduation dress.

Jumping from a moving bucket at Woodbury shaft at the Newport mine at Ironwood, Richard Neimi, thirty-five years old, dropped over 2,000 feet, his body being reduced to a pulp.

Eaton county Gleaners will hold a big roundup and gala day at Grand Ledge June 15. The Eaton and Ingham county roundup of Gleaners will be held at Eaton Rapids, August 26.

Mrs. Carl G. Jones, of Bay City, the wife of a designing engineer at the Kupman Electric company died of pneumonia. Mrs. Jones came to Bay City a bride six weeks ago from Pittsfield, Mass.

Odam Twardowski, who has been on trial at Grand Rapids in the superior court charged with manslaughter in connection with the killing of Anthony B. Borowicz, was found guilty by a jury.

Jessie Mead, daughter of O. S. Mead, two miles north of Reading, while nursing her mother, became despondent and committed suicide by drowning herself in the cistern at the family residence.

The mystery surrounding a human skeleton wrapped in paper in the attic of a Breedsville house was solved when a brother of Harry McGivern, who built the house, explained he brought the bones from Mexico, and forgot about them.

Two persons said to have figured in the sensational midnight ride which resulted in the death of Miss Iva Ford, and probable fatal injuries to E. G. Waltz, of St. Johns, were found and are said to be Ann and Fanny Klunkenburg of Zeeland.

Chaplain Cyrus Mendenhall has just celebrated the twenty-second anniversary of his coming to the Ionia prison to take charge of the religious department. Mr. Mendenhall has the longest record for service among prisoners in the United States.

Robert B. Buek, the proprietor of the Richmond Review, has installed a new printing press with a capacity 2,500 papers an hour. The machine is called the "Anniversary press," since its installment is coincident to the anniversary of the paper.

Mrs. Alice Hubbard Hissem, a Marshall belle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Hubbard, of Marshall, was granted an annulment of her marriage to Frank Hissem, of Detroit, whom she married two days after she met him at the Michigan-Cornell football game last fall.

Calmly slashing his throat after falling in an attempt to kill his wife and five-year-old son, swallowing two bichloride of mercury tablets and firing his father-in-law's house in three places, Silas B. Balcom, thirty-one years old, a barber, committed suicide as the climax to a spectacular family row.

G. R. Bromley, of Rochester, Mich., a science teacher in the Eaton Rapids high school, and Ferris Hall, a high school student, were drowned at Eaton Rapids and Burr Twitchell, another high school student, barely escaped drowning when the canoe in which they were riding upset in the back current below the dam on the Grand river.

Romantic aphasia that led to a marriage of a Hillsdale girl with a comparative stranger and the summary ejection of the bridegroom of twenty-four hours when she found him in her room, after she suddenly recovered her memory, figured in a local divorce court that enables Tena Shaw, nineteen years old, to regain her freedom from George Shaw.

The sentence by the Milwaukee court of hospital treatment for Dr. John B. Dexter, former Grand Rapids physician, was changed to a year in the county bridewell, in order to save his being extradited to Louisville and other southern cities, where he is wanted for forgery. Dr. Dexter became a drug user when an expert in treating the habit in others.
