## MICHIGAN NEWS ITEMS IN BRIEF

Paragraphs of Interest to Wolverine State Readers.

News of All Kinds Gathered From Various Points in the State and So Reduced in Size That it Will Appeal to All Classes of Readers.

William Moore, 60, died at his home at Ypsilanti.

Mrs. Smith J. Davis, Ypsilanti pioneer aged eighty-eight years, is dead.

Pike tourists opened their annual trip at Chicago on the morning of July 19.

H. Teople, aged 16, of North Adams, lost his right foot which was blown off by a cannon explosion.

About one hundred machinists at Kalamazoo, employed by the Clarage Fan company, went out on a strike.

With the thermometer at 83, drivers employed by the Consolidated Ice company went on a strike at Battle Creek.

Edmund Haight, aged 12, is held for the theft of an automobile belonging to Jacob DeHollander, of Richland.

Fred Newton, aged 20 years, of Ypsilanti, accidentally killed himself while loading a double-barreled muzzle loader shotgun.

Mrs. Mary M. Helmier, aged 82, one of the pioneers of that section of the state, died at her home in Muskegon after a short illness.

Rev. Father Joisten, 48, of Norway, a German Catholic priest, is dead of appendicitis. He was pastor of St. Mary's church seventeen years.

Search is being made for William Barnes, 67, a farmer, who is feared to have ended his life or was accidentally drowned in Meceday lake.

The sixtieth anniversary of Lutheran church was observed with crowded houses at the services, both morning and afternoon at Marshall.

The Muskegon-Oceana county cherry crop, injured by weather, will be about sixty-five to seventy per cent of normal, leading growers estimate.

For the first time it is declared in the history of the justice courts of Washtenaw, a man has been found guilty by a jury of being drunk.

Sheriff Ralph Chapman of Kalamazoo county began the slaughter of eighty-four dogs that are running about the county without a license.

Prosecuting Attorney Kent of Macomb county has been taken to the Washington hospital with a broken shoulder, the result of an automobile accident.

John Godall, aged seventy-six, of Jackson, was struck by a passenger train on the Michigan Central railroad and literally smashed to a mass of pulp.

John Hinman, deputy sheriff of Muskegon county at White Hall for eight years, died unexpectedly of apoplexy. He was a pioneer resident of that section of the state.

County officers placed a charge of manslaughter against John Musuadian, the taxi-driver, who ran down and killed August Green, sixty-two years old, a Muskegon carpenter.

Sault Ste. Marie's \$105,000 high school, under course of erection, has been discovered resting on quicksand. Large cracks have appeared in the inner and outer walls of the building.

The body of a young man, presumably a tramp, and aged about twenty years, was found on the Michigan Central tracks at Harg's station, a few miles south of Jackson.

Valuation of Wayne county is placed for taxation at near the billion mark in the report which was recommended to the board of supervisors by the board's committee on equalization.

After twenty-two years in the service, Arthur Amsten, of Saginaw and director of the thirty-third regiment band, has been rejected for the regular service, according to a letter received from him.

Two Lansing children, Vera Hannali, ten years old, and Edgar King, ten years old, were seriously hurt, the former possibly fatally, when an automobile, rushing to answer a fire alarm, struck them.

A search by Muskegon people for four-year-old Albert Laurin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alec Laurin, who had been missing, ended when his body was found in the weeds at the Hamilton dock, on Muskegon lake.

Physicians of Owosso refused to sign the death certificate of Mrs. Charles Parkhurst, thirty-six years old, who died suddenly at her home, near Bancroft, believing she was the victim of self-administered poison.

Bud Morris, of the Grand Rapids aviation school, and Dr. E. W. Reynolds, riding as a passenger, narrowly escaped being killed, when their hydroaeroplane turned over when about fifty feet in the air.

Trustees of the Michigan institution for the blind, in making up the biennial budget, for the institution, included an item of \$3,000 to establish a system of "home teaching" for blind people outside the institution.

Amendments recently adopted to the Flint local option ordinance prohibit any transportation company from delivering any intoxicating liquors to any one, except the person to whom they are shipped, and prevent the companies, which transport liquors, from allowing anyone else to sign receipts for liquors.

Cella Supitski, 6, gave up her life in a vain endeavor to save from drowning her five-year-old brother Joe.

C. R. Gildart, son of W. B. Gildart, editor of Albion Leader, and a junior in Albion college, has gone to West Point.

The body of John Pyant, an Indian about Harbor Springs, who has been missing since July 4, was found in Little Traverse Bay.

Grand Rapids reports that it has three cases of infantile paralysis. Doris Allen, three years old, is the latest victim to the disease.

Bortell brothers, fishermen employed around Lucington, found in their nets a rock sturgeon measuring 7 feet in length and weighing 180 pounds.

Nursing her child, whom she finally saved from death, following an attack of scarlet fever, Mrs. Herman Roundhouse died of the same disease at Muskegon.

Daniel Stivers, old resident of southern Michigan, died at his home in Litchfield, Mr. Stivers was 101 years of age in April and had lived in the county since he was a young man.

The death of Mrs. L. G. Ripley, wife of a Montague druggist, brought to a tragic conclusion a romance that began in the days preceding the civil war, and culminated in March, 1916.

Frank Bieschke, resident of Mecosta, aged 27 years, was kicked by a colt. His left arm was shattered from his shoulder to the elbow, ribs were broken and one lung punctured.

With minor changes from its original draft, Kalamazoo's new 75-cent gas ordinance, under which the Michigan Light company will operate, was adopted by a unanimous vote of the city council.

The grist mill at Hesperia, which has been a landmark in that part of the county for half a century, has been sold by Duncan McCallum to Read & Speas of Whitehall, the consideration being \$12,000.

The fifty-sixth wedding anniversary of Mrs. and Mrs. A. C. Proctor was observed at St. Joseph. Mr. Proctor is the only surviving delegate to the Republican convention that nominated Lincoln to the presidency.

Charles J. Corby, an automobile owner of Detroit, was taken in custody by Sheriff Hartway on the charge of manslaughter, in the case of John Reckinger, who died while with Corby in an auto accident at Mt. Clemens.

The first Flint lawsuit was dismissed by Circuit Judge Mark W. Stevens after seventy-nine years. The suit was an attachment, and was brought in 1837 by Chancey Bogue, against Timothy J. Walling.

Scalded by water, which he spilled down over the entire front of his body when he pulled over a pail, two-year-old Thaddeus Jowar, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Jowar, already suffering from measles, now lies fatally injured, at Muskegon.

Mrs. Sarah J. Collins, of Muskegon, the wife of Sheriff Fred J. Collins, wanted on a charge of having aided and abetted Joe Bodnar, of Detroit, and John Brown, of Chicago, in making their escape from the Muskegon county jail, fled but was found at Jackson.

The dying statement made at Muskegon by August Green, the aged carpenter, who was run down and killed by John Musuadian, a taxi cab driver, is counted upon by the latter to free him from a charge of manslaughter, pending against him.

For the first time in sixteen years at Albion, the voters of the local school district chose women members of the board of education at the annual meeting. Mrs. K. D. Davis and Mrs. George Brown, each president of local women's clubs, were elected.

A rattlesnake-dog fight was an exciting affair on farm of Benjamin Arndt at Hamilton. The dog attacked the reptile until it was dead. The snake, however bit the dog so badly the animal had to be killed. Arndt secured seven rattles for the loss of his dog.

Forgetfulness of Mrs. Fred J. Collins, jail matron and wife of the sheriff of Muskegon county, who left the jail door unlocked, was responsible for the escape of two of the most important prisoners locked up in the county jail.

H. M. Loud and Son Lumber company and Bruce Loud, transferred all their holdings on the Au Sauble river and shore of Lake Huron, which includes 97,000 acres, to a co-partnership composed by Selig Solomon, Joseph H. Hayes, and Frank E. Cowley.

Reconciliation with Duane Mosher, assistant attorney general, to whom she had been engaged, having failed, Miss Norah Barterm, twenty-seven-year-old schoolteacher of Port Huron, ended her life at Lansing by swallowing a quantity of bichloride of mercury while walking with him.

Miss Lois Slee, a Battle Creek girl, daughter of Reverend R. J. Slee, pastor of the First Methodist church, while riding from Charlotte to Battle Creek struck the top of the car so hard when the car hit an obstruction on the road that her nose was broken.

After a ride of eighty hours through portions of nine states, covering a distance of 1,947 miles, the Thirty-first regiment, Michigan national guard, is encamped in Camp Cotton, one mile from the heart of El Paso, only a few blocks from the banks of the Rio Grande river.

At Orion, Mrs. James Fenton, of Pittsburg, Pa., who has been spending a vacation at the Bellevue hotel, with her two small children, drowned swimming with friends. At Watkins lake, Damon Hanson, twenty-four, of Detroit, a member of the camping party from the Fort Street Presbyterian church, died while bathing.
