

**FRANCES KEITH CHAFFEE**

Mrs. Frances Keith Chaffee has entered into rest, a rest which in view of her nearly four score years of noble life and useful service, is well earned and richly deserved. If earnest endeavor; if sacrificial service; if kindly ministrations; if unselfishness, gentleness, patience, fortitude and courage; if these, to be the criterion of eternal rewards, then few more than she have ever merited the words of approbation, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Francis Katherine Keith was born near Galesburg, Michigan, on August 16th, 1838 and died at Paw Paw Michigan June 11th, 1918. She received her early education in the Galesburg public schools. She became a teacher and taught in Kalamazoo and Van Buren counties. On February 24th, 1856 she was married to Thomas J. Chaffee of Kalamazoo. They began housekeeping on a farm at Indian Fields, south of Kalamazoo and in 1859 they bought a farm in Waverly where they made their home until about fifteen years ago

when they moved to Paw Paw village. At the out break of the Civil war Mr. Chaffee enlisted and served for four years. He was commissioned a Lieutenant. He was wounded at Spotsylvania but was back in the service as soon as he was able.

Mr. and Mrs. Chaffee were the parents of five children, Stephen, Meredith, who died on June 9th, 1897; LaVerne M. the wife of Eugene Stevens, Minnie, who died in infancy, Mabel who has been the companion of her mother's declining years and who for the past two and a half years during which the deceased was a complete invalid, has been her most gentle nurse, and Lieutenant Mark J. who is now engaged in the U. S. Military service at Camp Custer.

Besides the children who are left, Mrs. Chaffee is survived by one brother, J. O. Keith of Bloomingdale, seven grand children, eleven great grand children, a number of nephews and nieces and a still larger number of loving neighbors and friends with whom her memory long shall last.

A splendid tribute to the life and character of Mrs. Chaffee is paid by Mrs. Norah (McFarlin) Culver, in the following lines.

"Home was the kingdom, love her dower,  
She sought no other wand of power.  
To make life sweet, bring heaven near,

To win a smile, to wipe a tear,  
And do her duty day by day,  
In her own quiet peaceful way.

Men in her creed were brave and true  
And women pure as pearls of dew,  
And life for her was high and grand,  
By work and glad endeavor spanned.

This sad old earth a bright place was  
For the sunshine of her face,




