WAR SAVINGS CONTEST REPLACES BASEBALL

Baseball has been placed on the shelf by the Detroit high school this season, and the boys are finding an acceptable substitute in the contest that has arisen in the sale of war savings stamps. An intense rivalry has sprung up between the high schools, and the contest waxes hot, with all the excitement that is usually attendant upon the baseball supremacy. There is the same interest in the relative positions of the schools, and the percentage is figured according to the average sales of war savings stamps per pupil.

This is a patriotic suggestion that could be adopted by all school baseball clubs throughout the state.

To encourage the practice of these virtues by all Americans, rich and poor, is one of the primary objects of the War Savings Plan.

America must save this year \$2,000,000,000.00 and loan it to the Government by buying War Savings Stamps.

Most of us thought War Savings Stamps were only for children and for others who couldn't afford to invest more than a quarter or half-dollar at a time to help win our war for liberty. THAT IS WRONG. War Savings Stamps are for everybody—men, women, children, millionaires, poor folks—all of us.

Michigan must invest this year \$70,000,000.00 in War Savings Stamps. Think what it means to raise this huge sum—when you realize that it is but \$5,000,000.00 less than Michigan's quota in the Third Liberty Loan, and nobody can own more than \$1,000.00 of the Little Baby Bonds.
