CHANCERY COURT.—Hon. DAVID CAMPBELL, presiding—is now in session. Maj. HORSE RACKS.—The corporate authorities, with commendable foresight, have caused to be erected on the common, near the bank of Pleasant Run, eight large horse racks for the accommodation of country people. They design to make additional improvements this fall by surrounding the racks with shade trees. Thus it will be seen that our authorities are disposed to favor our country friends in this respect, as much as they favor the town people in an ordinance passed recently and published in this paper, concerning the hitching of horses to private premises.

Military Arrests.

We have been silly enough to believe that the days of military arrests and military demonstrations were past in this country, but it seems we have been laboring under a great delusion. Four citizens of this county, named, Geo. Wells, James Russell, Geo. Keef and John Sullivan were arrested by a squad of U. S. cavalry on Saturday and Sunday last, and are now in the penitentiary at Nashville, charged with having murdered a negro about the 1st of July last. It is claimed that the arrest was made under Gen. Grant's recent order, when, in fact, people in this benighted region have been indulging the belief that the President's recent proclamation abrogated that order. A writ of habeas corpus will test the matter we suppose, which, we hope, will be applied for immediately.
