COTTON.—Those who wish to ship cotton to Nashville can find out the proper way to proceed by referring to the card of Stratton, Cheney & Roy in this issue.

Several new legal advertisements make their appearance this morning, which the reader had better refer to.

We desire to call the especial attention of our friend of the Lincoln County News to a paragraph in Mrs. O. M. SPOFFORD's report of the "Beneficent Society for Giles county," published in the Citizen to-day, that he may stir the benevolent and patriotic people of Lincoln into action. It will be seen from the report that three soldiers in that county were furnished with limbs by the society at Nashville, upon the recommendation of the Giles county society, with the positive assurance of one or two prominent gentlemen of Lincoln that the society should receive help from that county. Not a cent has yet been received from that county by the society. We will look for a better report from old Lincoln in a short time.

Court.—The first jury case that was taken up by the circuit court last week was not given to the jury until late Saturday evening. The case was that of Joseph C. Anthony and others, vs. Sam'l S. Williamson, involving four or five acres of land, and has been on the docket six or eight years. The jury had until Monday morning to deliberate, when, having failed to agree, they were discharged.

The criminal docket was taken up last Monday, but no cases have yet been finally disposed of.

FIRE IN NASHVILLE.—Another fire occurred in Nashville on Wednesday morning last, commencing at the corner of Bellview street and Park Avenue. Loss estimated at \$5,000.

Great Fire in Columbia. On Saturday night last a fire broke out in the variety store of J. M. Houston, on the Public Square, at Columbia, soon spreading to others, and before the terrible tide of conflagration could be stemmed, the entire block on the Northwest corner of the Square was a mass of smoldering ruins.

At one time it seemed as if the great sea of flames would engulf everything, and only the greatest energy and perseverance on the part of the citizens prevented fearful destruction.

Six stores were burnt—loss \$100,000. Both branches of the Legislature of Tennessee, Wednesday, adopted a resolution to adjourn on the 17th instant, and meet again January 14th.

\$600,000 Lost!—The School Fund of the State, amounting to the above sum, is lost. The Treasurer of the State took the responsibility upon himself to lend it to a National Bank in Memphis, without the knowledge or consent of the authorities.—Now the Bank breaks, and the School Fund goes up.

A large number of negro laborers have, in a meeting at Nashville, organized a strike for forty cents an hour. About 200 at work on the levee struck for that sum, Wednesday.

The Supreme Court has not promulgated a decision against the constitutionality of the test oath, but has practically annulled the law prescribing the oath, by administering only the ordinary oath on admission of attorneys.

Dr. J. C. Stocum, of Shelbyville, Indiana, has been sued for seduction by a negro of that town. The Doctor was married some six months ago to a white young lady.

It is now said that Hon. Reverdy Johnson will soon take the portfolio of Secretary of State. At all events, it is pretty certain something has gone wrong recently, for it is generally whispered in diplomatic circles that Mr. Seward will soon retire.

Return the Plunder. The New York Journal of Commerce is reiterating the call upon persons who have in their parlors, churches, etc., there, things that were stolen from the South, during the war, to send them back. That paper says:

"An old friend of ours, a Union man in the South through all the war, told us that his chandeliers were in a certain house in Massachusetts, his piano in another, and various family treasures in others. He had traced them to their positions.

"We have heard of a Southern lady sitting down at a Northern table and recognizing silver on that table as her own. We have heard of a lady receiving from an officer a present of jewelry, which she recognized as the jewelry of a Southern lady who had been her old schoolmate and friend.—Public sentiment needs to be aroused to this subject, and the holders of such goods should be compelled, by the indignation of their honest fellow-citizens, to send them back."
