Mr. L. S. Rupert of Washington, Ill., has purchased the trotting sire Hero of Thordale.

The Banner says that the talk about Ripple beating Hindoo is "All in my eye, Betty Martin."

The gray colt Howling Green is reported as being in splendid form and is considered a dangerous antagonist for the all-aged stakes.

Mr. V. L. Kirkman of Nashville recently purchased two fillies by Blackwood, Jr. The two in question are one sisters to Hollywood.

Ed. Geers has about thirty horses in his training stable at Columbia, Mo. He will carry eight or ten of the best ones on the northern circuit this summer.

A mare by Miggins, the property of Mr. Van Holman, Nashville, foaled a better horse than any young mare with glanders last week. He was forty inches high at time of birth.

It is said that the Nashville track is now in better condition than it has been for years, and it is predicted that next time will be made this spring.

"Old man Wallace" is continually in hot water. We frequently see hard things said about him, but no one has ever truly faithfully called him a fool.

The breeder of the great pacer, Sorrel Dan, says he was sired by Hale's Redback, by old Redback, and that Dan's dam was a "mare of extra nerve and bottom."

Col. McDaniels, with his fine string of Harry Bassett's, King Nero at their head, has arrived at Nashville, and will take part in the spring races at that place.

It will be a strange thing if Hindoo wins the Derby, stranger still if Barcroft wins the cup, and more wonderful than all, if Hindoo, being owned by George W. Cable, did not win the Merchants' Stakes.

John Turner will pull the ribbons over the following great horses of the coming season: Trinket, Hannis, Daisydale, Chance, Nil Desperandum, King, Kentucky Wilkes, and the pacer Ben Hamilton, 2:16.

The colt Followplay is looming up wonderfully in public favor, and the colt that beats him for the Kentucky Derby will know that he has been in a race. He is now second or third choice for that event.

Courier Journal: "A famous Tennessee saddle mare, Belle of Tennesse, has recently given birth to a filly foal by the sire of Mattie Hunter. Both the sire and dam being famous in the stock, it is not difficult to predict the character of this youngling."

The black gelding Jewett, with a three year old record of 2:23, was recently purchased for \$15,000 by Peter Shantz of Bethel, Penn. He was bought by Alvin West, son of Almont, and his record has never been beaten by any colt at that age.

The Spirit of the Times claims to have information from Mr. Vanderbilt to the effect that Manf. S. will not be allowed to start in the Kentucky horse while owned as now. She will trot against time only, as her owner considers trials of this kind the only true measure of speed.

The great stallion race to be trotted at Benson, Pa., on Friday, Sept. 15, closed with 13 entries as follows: Santa Claus, Bob McGreggor, Wedgewood, Alexander, Voltario, Hannis, Bonester, Monroe Chief, Nil Desperandum, Hambleton, King, Kentucky Wilkes, Conster and Piedmont.

The "Brow Park" sale of Short-horn cattle came off in Chicago on the 13th. A Mr. G. A. Degrad paid \$4,200 for the 1st Duke of Oxford and \$7,700 for the 8th Duke of Kirkcubright. The average price per head was \$514. Who is it that says breeding fine cattle will not pay?

A correspondent from Nashville writes that he is of the opinion that Jim Malone is the best colt in the country, and says that all a person has to do to make money is to bet on him and win. He says that he has broken down or falls. We noticed that a short while since the book-makers were giving the immense odds of 250 to 1 on him for some St. Louis races.

Prospero, a name Trot and Elaine, with records under 2:25, had for sire Messenger Duroc, and for dam Green Mountain Maid. These, we believe, are the three fastest from one sire and dam. Jim Malone is sired by Harry Bassett, Tom Fulano, Charley Howard and Franklin were the produce of Lexington and Canary Bird. Rutherford, Followplay, Lexington, four mile record, and Spendthrift, were from imp. Australian and Aerolite.

It looks as if the owners of the fastest Almont Jr. and Blackwood Jr. colts are afraid of each other. We hear that Almont Jr. has expressed a willingness to back their respective horses, but somehow the matter was dropped where it started. We however learn that the admirer of the fast Annie W. intends backing her strongly for her races in the north this season and that they are confident of winning a goodly pile of filthy lucre.

Since the above was written we have received information from a reliable gentleman that arrangements are being made for a match race which will be looked forward to with much interest. This contest is being set well to remark that the controversy at Pulaski and why not end it here? This is about the only disinterested parties near at hand, and besides, the very good track.
