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GILES DEMOCRACY.

Proceedings of the County Convention Last Monday.

Pursuant to call, the district delegates met in the circuit court room last Monday at noon and were called to order by Capt. J. R. Crow, chairman of the county committee. The convention at once selected Dr. E. Edmundson as chairman, who announced the object of the assembly, to be the selection of delegates to the Nashville convention on the 18th June to nominate a candidate for governor, railroad commissioners, appoint delegates to Chicago and presidential electors. Lays, D. McFord and Jno. S. Wilkes were made secretaries.

On motion, the chair appointed as committee on credentials W. S. Newbill, Dr. Lock, Z. W. Ewing, Alex. Patton, R. F. Yancy, who reported full lists of delegates present from all the districts except the 1st, 10th and 16th.

The convention resolved to permit any democrat present from the districts to represent to represent their districts to-day.

Mr. Pearcey moved that one delegate from each district be appointed to select five men as delegates to Nashville from his district.

Mr. Mitchell moved in lieu that the district delegates meet each in separate bodies and select five delegates to Nashville.

As the party of the people it is incumbent on the constitutional liberty and the inspiration of true republicanism. Daring its origin and its development, it has been the champion of the oppressed, the federal constitution, under its benign rule our infant republic grew and prospered. Its temporary overthrow by sectional animosities and the bitterness of divided councils, its restoration is the urgent need of the hour.

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Mr. Newbill withdrew his resolution.

A motion to lay Dr. Harwell's resolution on the table failed.

A motion to lay all resolutions relating to the tariff carried.

A motion made to take the original from the table was defeated by motion to lay that motion on the table.
