The Civil Rights Bill.

We give for the more complete

lightenment of our readers, the text

of the bill as adopted by Congress,

and submitted to the President.

Sec. 1. That all persons in the

United States, and not subject to any

foreign power, excluding Indians not

taxed, are hereby declared to be citizens

of the United States; and such

citizens, of every race and color,

without regard to any previous condition

of slavery or involuntary servitude,

except as a punishment for crime

whereof the party shall have been duly

convicted, shall have the same right in

every State and Territory to make and

enforce contracts, to sue, to be sued,

to purchase, lease, sell, hold, and convey

real and personal property, and to full

and equal benefit of all laws and

proceedings for the security of person and

property as are enjoyed by white citizens;

and shall be subject to like punishment,

pains and penalties, and to none other

than those which are provided by law

in relation to the same.

Sec. 2. That any person who shall

knowingly and wrongfully obstruct, hinder,

or prevent any officer or other person

charged with the execution of any

warrant or process issued under the

provisions of this act, or any person or

persons lawfully assisting him or them

in the execution of such warrant or process

shall be liable to a fine not exceeding

one thousand dollars, or imprisonment

not exceeding one year, or both, in the

discretion of the Court.

Sec. 3. That the District Courts

of the United States, within their

respective districts, shall have, exclusively

of the courts of the several States, cognizance

of all crimes and offenses committed

against the provisions of this act, and

also concurrently with the Circuit

Courts of the United States, of all

crimes, civil and criminal, affecting

all persons who are denied, or cannot

enforce in the Courts of judicial

tribunal of the State or locality where

they are, any of the rights secured by

this act; and the first session of this

act, if any suit or prosecution, civil or

criminal, has been or shall be commenced

in any State Court against any

person for any cause whatsoever, civil

or criminal, or for any other offense,

trespass, or wrong done or committed

by virtue of or under the authority, or

color of authority derived from this

act, or the act of establishing a bureau

for the relief of freedmen and refugees,

and all acts amendatory thereof, or

any act amendatory of this act, or
