LOCAL MATTERS.

Religious.

Large Potatoes.
Rev. STEPHEN BLANCHARD of this city, last evening, presented us with some of the finest potatoes we ever saw; sixteen of them weighing sixteen pounds. They are of the California variety.

Butter.
Our farmers are demanding from 40 to 50 cents per pound for butter. The price in Atchison county, we notice, is from 15 to 20 cents. Why this difference? We don't think the dairymen would eat much butter themselves, did they have such a price to pay.

Health of the County.
We are told that "Chills and Fever" prevails to a considerable extent in Sharpe's Grove and vicinity, and also in the Missouri Bottom, in this county. In the central and Southern portion of the county, the people have never enjoyed better health.

Religious Revival.
A GREAT revival is progressing at Sharp's Grove, in the northern portion of this county. The meeting is being conducted by Rev. BREED, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. About fifteen joined the Church on the evening of the 12th. The meeting has been in progress for a week or more, and is to be continued as long as there is a prospect of more good being accomplished. Many more, it is thought, will join.

Organized.
The citizens of Sharp's Grove, in the northern portion of this county, have organized themselves into a safety committee, for the purpose of protecting themselves against horse-thieves. They held a meeting on the 9th, at which officers were elected, and a fund created for defraying the expenses of their weekly meetings. The idea is a good one. We opine that hereafter that section will remain unmolested by thieving bands. Such an organization would be advisable in the Missouri Bottom, in the Hinkle neighborhood.

More Robbery.
We learn that a man named Snow, who had recently opened a store on the river, in the northern portion of this county, was, on last Friday, robbed of seven hundred dollars in money, and a large quantity of goods. Four men, with their faces blacked, and with drawn revolvers, entered his store and compelled him to deliver to them whatever they wanted. They took as many of the goods as they could carry. Mr. Snow could not detect from their voices who they were. The people of that section could not obtain the least clew to their whereabouts, and it seems impossible to conjecture where they are from.

Trouble at Mound City.
We hear that a row occurred on Tuesday at Mound City. It appears that enough liquor had been obtained, ostensibly for medical purposes, from a drug store, to make a party of four or five "good and drunk," and that a fight ensued in which a man named SIBERT, was badly cut. At last accounts he was not expected to recover.

"Who hath Woe?"
Court week passed off with less than the usual amount of disturbance which attends such days. A row or two, we learn, occurred on Monday, resulting, as a matter of course, from a too free indulgence of the appetite, and a consequent free expression of opinions in regard to individuals. JENU FOSTER and a young man named MARION, two of the actors, "pitched into" each other in a spirited manner, but the interference of friends prevented any serious injury to either party.

A collision also occurred immediately in front of our office, between two individuals we took to be slightly "cornered"—one an old man from the country. There was a great waste of "pet names," and a few gentle expressions of dislike, on the occasion. The use of profane language was, of course, discouraged. No arrests, that we heard of, were made.

Kansas at Her Old Tricks—Appropriating Fruit by the Wagon Load.
We have been creditably informed, that along the borders of Cass county and Jackson, men cross over the border with their wagons and teams, robbing orchards in Missouri, by loading their wagons with apples, without license or pay, and remove the same.
This is a part of the natural result of Gen. Ewing's Order No. 11, and the force of bad habit; but we have peace now and such jayhawking should cease.
The people of Kansas and no other people will patiently submit to such despoliation without defending their property. Hence, for the sake of right and good neighborhood, we direct the attention of the Kansas authorities to the outrage practiced upon peaceable farmers in Missouri, that these depredations cease and friendly relations prevail between neighbors.

Our informant tells us that some of the apple raiders, intimidated to the farmers thus damaged, that they would return as soon as winter should set in, and supply themselves with pork, as they had done last year. The farmers of this State are quite peaceable, law-abiding men, but they are now permitted to carry arms, and if their property is thus invested, bloody collisions will be the result.—[Kansas City Advertiser.]

Sad Affair.
A very melancholy event befel the family of Mr. Henry Motonger last week, in the death of that gentleman, under very distressing circumstances. He was on his way, with his family, from Ohio, to locate among us in Gentry, and had sent his family ahead from St. Joseph, to await his coming here. They arrived Saturday evening and he on Sunday morning, but he came to them so suddenly and ready for the grave. It was a terrible shock to them and away among strangers there was nothing to alleviate their grief.
Mr. Motonger was aged 59 years, and came from Stark County, Ohio where he had long resided and been known as an upright and estimable citizen.—[Albany (Mo.) News, 10th.]
