Legislative. The Railroad bill, which finally passed both Houses of the Legislature, on the 8th, has not yet been acted upon by the Governor.

The School Law, Revenue Law, and the reorganization of judicial circuits and district courts, under the New Constitution, are the most important matters now to be acted upon by the Legislature.

Meeting in Andrew--A Soldier's Monument. A meeting was held at Savannah, Mo., on the 5th, to ascertain the practicability of erecting a monument to the memory of the Union soldiers of that county, and to organize an association for that purpose.

Geo. Knapp, one of the proprietors of the St. Louis Republican, and R. T. Colburn, a sub-editor of the New York Tribune, were arrested in New York on the 2d inst., upon the complaint of A. F. Stewart, a noted merchant, founded upon certain allegations which appeared in a letter of Mr. Colburn to the Republican as its New York correspondent.

The peace of a neighborhood in DeKalb county, was outraged recently, as follows: On the night of the 6th inst., a party of nine men, with faces blacked so as to escape recognition, went to the house of a man named Webb, residing on Third Fork, DeKalb county, near the corner of Andrew, and first demanded all the arms about.

From the Springfield Journal of the 5th, we learn that there came near being a deal of trouble over the recent affray in the streets of that place. The country people "were roused to such a pitch," says that paper, "that they raised an armed company of about 100 men, and marched into town, Tuesday, determined to have a change.

A TIN WEDDING recently came off at Hannibal, Mo. Tin ware was brought into requisition in a great variety of forms, useful and ornamental. Refreshments were brought and served on tin, and the bride's loaf, trimmed with a tin wreath and tin flowers, was much admired.

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For the SENTINEL. A Soldier's Monument Association. OREGON, Mo., Feb. 8th, 1866. Ed. SENTINEL: I desire to call the attention of your citizens, to an enterprise recently initiated in the adjoining county of Andrew. I refer to the "Andrew county Soldier's Monument Association."

It is proposed to build, at the county seat, a monument as elegant in design, and elaborate in execution, as the liberality of the citizens of the county will warrant, upon the sides of which are to be inscribed: 1st, the name of every union soldier who, enlisting from the County, was killed, or died, in the service during the rebellion; 2d, the names of such soldiers, enlisting from the county, as still survive; 3d, an inscription to "THE UNKNOWN DEAD" of the war--those brave men whose resting place bears no memorial mark.

It is proposed to accompany each name on the Monument, with a fitting memorial inscription; deeds of bravery, the battles in which they participated, &c.

A location, as central as possible will be selected, where, say one block of ground will be devoted to the Monument. This block will be ornamented with the landscape gardener's art, and in time become a beautiful park, while the Monument in the center will attest for all time, the devotion of the County to the Government in the hour of peril.

I, Mr. Editor, am but a recent comer; I design to live here, however, and I know no man will object, that even a stranger, as I am, should suggest to the citizens of Holt County, that they follow the example of Andrew County.

A trifling sum from each loyal citizen, would erect a monument in Oregon of which any county might be justly proud. It would be an assurance to men from the Older States, who seek homes in Missouri, that Holt county was truly loyal. It would add twenty-five per cent. to the value of real estate in the town where it was built, and above all it would render fitting honor, to the memory of those brave souls who have laid down their lives upon the altar of country.

Shall such an association be formed in Holt County? Who will say nay? Above all who will initiate the good work?

It is not fitting for a new comer to make the first move in this direction; I therefore appeal to some one of your old citizens, Mr. Editor, to call a meeting to consider this subject; promising to lend it all the aid in my power.

REV. ALEXANDER CAMPBELL.--We learn from an exchange that this distinguished divine and leader of a reform in the Baptist Church, popularly known as "Campbellism," and one of the most profound scholars on the Continent, died in Kentucky, lately. Mr. Campbell was a brilliant debater, and his controversies with Bishop Purcell, of Cincinnati, Robert Dale Owen, Rev. Mr. Rice, Presbyterian clergyman, and others, on theological points, have been published, and very widely read. Throughout Missouri the Christian Church has many members who will be grieved to learn that their great leader is no more, and will drop a tear to his memory, for in his death a great light has been quenched and a noble man has gone to rest with his fathers.

BILL REYNOLDS, a notorious bushwhacker at Pleasant Hill, conducted himself recently in such a manner that an attempt was made to arrest him. Thos. Holmes and James Copeland detailed for that purpose were killed, and Reynolds temporarily escaped but was afterwards arrested and killed by a brother of Copeland.

S. S. Brooks, Sr., died in Quincy, Ill., on the 11th ult. He was one of the oldest printers and publishers in the West. He founded in Cincinnati the first daily paper ever issued west of the Allegheny mountains. More than forty years ago he established a newspaper in Edwardsville.

THE Fenians of Canada have issued an address to the American Brotherhood, endorsing the O'Mahoney faction, declaring the true and only object of the movement to be the freedom of Ireland, and denouncing the proposition to go to Ireland by the way of Canada.

A whole village in Upper Hesseia, Germany, is reported to have sold out with the determination to remove to Missouri in the spring.

NEW ORLEANS, after the 1st of March is to be lighted by three thousand petroleum lamps. The charges of the gas company are considered excessive.
