CITY COUNCIL.

COUNCIL ROOM, September 20th, 1867.

Board of Councilmen met pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Messrs. Marsh, Masters, Hart, Ourtis, Kreek, Kyger, Van Buskirk and Kaucher.

Jas. S. Hart, President of the Board, occupied the chair. John G. Cottrell, Mayor, and Wm. Baskins, Constable, were also present. Solomon Comer presented a bill of \$16, for labor performed on streets. On motion it was allowed, and warrant ordered to be drawn on the Treasurer for the amount.

Messrs. Hawkins & Wing presented bill of \$4, accompanied by their affidavit that they were indebted to the city for taxes to that amount. The bill was allowed, and warrant for same ordered to be drawn in favor of Wm. Baskins, City Collector.

The proposition of Messrs. A. M. Swan and John D. Abel, to construct the street and alley crossings, provided for by Ordinance No. 50, for sixty and one half cents per square yard was presented. On motion City Attorney was required to draw and sign a contract with Messrs Swan and Abel—they to furnish the material, and complete said crossings by the 15th day of Nov., 1867.

Board adjourned to meet on the first Wednesday in Nov. next.

NODAWAY COUNTY.

NODAWAY county has voted, by a handsome majority, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars as capital stock to the M. & M. R. A. L. Railroad, and the same amount to the Missouri Valley Railroad, making in all two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The vote stood 524 for and 178 against; majority over two-thirds 168.

RAILROAD MATTERS.

There has been so much "Gne" expended upon the subject of the railroad between Hamburg and Council Bluffs, that people had commenced thinking it was the intention to build the road of that material, and perhaps run the trains with gas instead of steam, but at least something substantial has been done. Engineer Ferriss, on Thursday, completed the purchase of sixty acres of land adjoining town, located the place for depot, machine shops &c., and will commence building soon as practicable. All the necessary money has been raised, material is plenty and more men are hired every week. The road is now within three miles of Eastport. From Eastport to Hamburg, the distance is twelve miles and the track is graded. They are determined to push it to the Missouri line in the quickest possible time; and when it reaches Eastport fifteen days will amply suffice to build the remaining portion to Hamburg.—[Hamburg Times, 21st.

We learn just as we are going to press, from a reliable source, that a mover, passing through Vernon county, coming north, was murdered by two men, near Kelley's Ferry. The robbers rode out of the brush and asked him if he was armed. Receiving a reply in the negative, they shot the mover, and after robbing him of \$1,600 took one span of horses and left for parts unknown. The mover had a wife who was left in the road with her dead husband.—[Bates Co., Record.

At Forest City, Missouri, September 17th, 1867, Mr. WILLIAM DUDEN, in the 61st year of his age.
