

FROM PIKE'S PEAK.—Greely writes to the New York Tribune from Denver City under date of June 10th as follows:

There is gold here but it is harder to get it by digging than in almost any other way. A few will make fortunes here while many will lose all and go away utterly bankrupt. But the glorious Rocky Mountains are themselves worth a visit. They are not a range but a chaos of mountains three hundred miles broad with their forks their snowy peaks their grassy hill sides their ravines and their glorious forests. The air is gloriously pure the hill side dotted with springs the ravines musical with running streams that never dry up.

Thirty jewels of great value were found in the same coffin by the side of the king as was also a hatchet of gold ornamented with figures in lapis lazule. Some years ago M. Mariette had a similar piece of good fortune in finding in the tomb Apis the jewels which now form the principal ornament of the Egyptian Museum of the Louvre. The jewels of Amosi are still more valuable from their number and quality. This discovery of a royal tomb intact is the most important one that M. Mariette has yet made in Egypt.

At the meeting of the Democratic State Convention at Milledgeville Ga., on the 16th inst. Governor Brown the present incumbent, was re-nominated by acclamation as the Democratic candidate for Governor at the coming election.
