If there is any one thing more needed by the general public more than another it is an improvement on the public highways. Any movement which will tend to better roads will be unanimously endorsed by the public.

The great fortunes that will be affected by the income tax have been accumulated in most cases by the aid of legislation that has granted special privileges to special classes. This being true it is both logical and just that these special classes should be subjected to a tax which, in a measure, will equalize the burdens of taxation. To put it plainly the effects of the income tax will be to return to the public treasury a very small per cent. of money wrongfully exacted from the people.

If the Southern people since the war had invested their money in their respective localities, the South would now be enjoying a far greater degree of prosperity than at present. The cotton crop is a money crop and brings into the South a vast amount of money every year. Until within the last year or two the greater part of this money has been sent to the North for manufactured articles and to the West for provisions.

The Southern people are just beginning to find out that they can produce the meat and grain they need for themselves and stock, and in portions of some of the Southern States, they are doing it. They find it pays them to do it.

What they want now is factories to make the clothing they need and the agricultural implements and machinery required on their farms and the ties and bagging for their cotton.

Proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of Bossier Levee District.

BOSSIER CITY, LA., THURSDAY, JUNE 7, 1894.

The Board of Commissioners of the Bossier Levee District met in regular session. Present: W. H. Hodges, President; Messrs. P. B. Cash, W. T. Colquitt, H. J. Lenoir, A. J. Moss, Thos. G. Pickett. Absent: T. W. W. Stinson.

Mr. E. H. Randolph, attorney, was present. The minutes of April 27th were read and approved.

The following ordinances were read:

An Ordinance Levying a Ten Mill Tax on all the Property in Bossier Levee District subject to Taxation for Levee Purposes, for year 1894.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Bossier Levee District, in regular session convened, That a District Levee tax of ten mills on the dollar of its assessed valuation be, and the same is hereby levied, on all property situated in the Bossier Levee District, subject to taxation, for levee purposes, for the year 1894.

An Ordinance Levying a Local Assessment of five cents per acre of Alluvial Land within the Bossier Levee District, for year 1894.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Bossier Levee District, in regular session convened, That a local assessment of five cents per acre on each and every alluvial acre of land within the Bossier Levee District, for the year 1894, be and is hereby levied.

An Ordinance Levying a Local Assessment of Sixty Dollars per mile on Railroads within Bossier Levee District, for year 1894.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Bossier Levee District, in regular session convened, That a local assessment of sixty dollars per mile be, and is hereby levied, for the year 1894, on every mile of railroad situated within the Bossier Levee District.

An Ordinance Levying a Special Assessment of five cents per Bale on each Bale Cotton raised within Bossier Levee District, for year 1894.

Whereas, The funds to arise from the ten mill District Levee tax, five cents acreage tax and sixty dollars a mile railroad tax, for year 1894, are not sufficient to locate, construct and repair levees, so as to prevent disastrous floods;

Be it Resolved and Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Bossier Levee District in regular session convened, That a special assessment of fifty cents per bale be, and is hereby levied, on every bale of cotton produced in the Bossier Levee District on lands subject to taxation in said District, during year 1894.

On motion of Mr. Lenoir, seconded by Mr. Pickett, the above and foregoing ordinances and resolutions were adopted.

Mr. T. G. Pickett presented an account for \$275 00 for repairing and maintaining the Magenta Levee, and work done on the Pruitt Levee, during last high water.

On motion of Mr. Moss, the account was allowed.

On motion, Mr. Pickett was allowed \$21 for expense attending meetings of the Board.

The President appointed Messrs. Colquitt, Lenoir and Moss as a Committee to visit lower end of the District, to investigate the line with the view of continuing the work to the end of the District.

On motion, duly seconded, the President and Secretary were authorized to draw the following Warrants on the State Auditor:

On motion of Mr. Moss, the Board adjourned to meet the first Thursday, the 6th day of September, 1894.
