Police Jury Proceedings

The Police Jury of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, met in their regular session, Tuesday, July 13, 1920, in regular session, with members present at roll call, viz: G. T. Mays, R. E. McNamee, W. B. Wilbourn, E. M. Coyle, R. D. Whittington and J. G. McNamee.

The minutes of the meetings of May 11th and June 15th were read in open session and approved.

The Police Jury then proceeded to complete its organization by electing the following officers, each for the period of two years:

R. B. Hill as Clerk, at a salary of \$1200 per year.

W. H. Smith as Parish Treasurer, at a salary of \$600 per year.

A. D. Scanland as Parish Printer, at a salary of \$500 per year.

Dr. C. M. Tucker as President of Board of Health, Bossier Parish, at a salary of \$100 per year, and the President appointed as members of the Parish Board of Health Messrs. Wilbourn and Whittington, members of this body.

President Mays then proceeded to and did appoint the following standing committees for the term of two years:

Auditing Committee—Messrs. Coyle, J. G. McNamee and Wilbourn.

Bridge Committee—Messrs. E. McNamee, Wilbourn, Mays, Coyle, Whittington and J. G. McNamee.

The Police Jury then proceeded to make a budget for the year 1920, and the following members were appointed to the Budget Committee, viz: Messrs. J. G. McNamee, Wilbourn and Whittington, which committee, after due deliberation, made the following report as a budget for the year 1920, to-wit:

Table with 2 columns: APPROPRIATIONS, Sheriff's salary and expenses, Constables and justices of peace, Board of Health, Parish printing, Assessor's salary and expenses, Parish Treasurer, Clerk Police Jury, Demonstration Farm Agent, Gretnoville Orphanage, Shreveport Girls' Training School, Police Jury, per diem and mileage, Court expenses, Dipping vat expenses, Election expenses, Paupers' account, Bossier Parish Fair Association, Bonds and bridges, Jail bonds, etc., Sport Anti-Tuberculosis League, Jail expenses, District Attorney's fees, Sinking fund, Miscellaneous fund.

The parish rate of taxation is hereby fixed and levied at 5 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all assessable property in Bossier Parish, Louisiana, 5 mills is hereby apportioned as follows: Public schools, 1 1/2 mills; roads and bridges, 1 mill; general and miscellaneous, 2 1/2 mills.

We further levy a special tax of 1 1/2 mills throughout this parish for the benefit of public schools, in pursuance of Act 218 of 1918 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana.

We also levy a special tax in Road Districts No. 1, 2, 3 and 4, to take up the bonds and interest on the bonds of these districts as follows: Road District No. 1, 4 mills; Road District No. 2, 3 mills; Road District No. 3, 3 1/2 mills.

We, your Budget Committee, herewith submit the foregoing as a budget for the year 1920, for your approval and adoption.

On motion and second, duly carried, the foregoing report of the Budget Committee was adopted.

The following resolution was presented and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, it is necessary for this parish to pay, or to be in a position to pay, within a short time, 50 per cent of the total cost of three miles of gravel to be a portion of the Bossier City-Ninock Highway, which is a completion of said highway to the Bossier Parish line, and the cost of such gravel is to be paid out of the funds of Road District No. 1, as soon as the same are available, and whereas said funds are not yet available, and the taxes levied for said purpose in said road district, not having been collected, and

Whereas, the American National Bank of Shreveport, La., the fiscal agent and banker of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, has agreed to advance such funds as may be necessary for said purpose, not to exceed \$15,000, with the understanding and agreement that it will have a first call and pledge on said funds of said Road District No. 1 when collected, and that said bank is to reimburse itself out of said funds when the same are deposited therein, therefore,

Resolved, That the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, acting for said Road District No. 1, do hereby authorize the bank and stipulations, and in order to secure said advance for any amounts which it may advance as above, hereby pledges said funds of said road district to the payment of said amount, and specially agrees that said bank is to have a first call thereon until the amount is paid in full, and that it is hereby authorized to apply said funds as such when deposited to said indebtedness until it is finally paid in full, and that such interest thereon as is provided under its fiscal agency contract with this parish; the President of this body being hereby specially authorized to execute and sign any and all contracts that may be necessary or required by said bank in carrying out the terms hereof.

Dr. C. H. Iron appeared before the Police Jury and submitted to them the following letter, addressed to the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board with the request that this Police Jury memorialize said board and ask them to carry into effect the request as set out in the following letter which was unanimously adopted by the Police Jury:

To the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, Baton Rouge, Louisiana,

Gentlemen: Whereas certain contagious or infectious diseases have been more or less prevalent amongst the live stock of Bossier Parish for the past several years, with disastrous results, and falling hardest upon those of our citizens who are least able to afford the expense of veterinary relief, we respectfully and urgently request your honorable board to send to Bossier Parish at your earliest convenience a well equipped and practical veterinarian to inspect and qualify at least one man for each of the six wards of Bossier Parish to do the necessary work of vaccination in order that the diseases which have been successfully treated to date may be prevented in the future, and in the event of your honorable board may be, if not entirely eradicated, kept under sufficient control to save the valuable live stock interest of our people.

We are informed by Mr. E. S. Burr, Farm Demonstration Agent for Bossier Parish, that many hundreds of hogs have died recently, which could have been saved by prompt and proper attention.

The Police Jury of Bossier Parish commits itself to such assistance and support, also as in the opinion of your honorable board is necessary to carry out the work specified in the foregoing letter.

Police Jury Proceedings

The following petition was presented to the Police Jury and its request granted, with the understanding that said road will be opened without expense to the parish and that the right-of-way granted to said parish be the usual width for roads as now fixed by the Police Jury, which said right-of-way is to be without cost:

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned voters and taxpayers of Ward Two, do respectfully ask you, the Police Jury, to grant to us a right-of-way to be opened without expense to the parish, to be without cost:

The following report of the Sheriff was received and ordered filed:

To the Police Jury of Bossier Parish:

Gentlemen: I submit the following as a statement of parish taxes collected during the month of June, 1920:

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Police Jury:

Resolved, That the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, in open, legal and public session, do hereby order that after July 15, 1920, the dipping of cattle will be discontinued in Wards Three, Four and Five of Bossier Parish and that all vats in use in said wards be discontinued in any said wards Three, Four and Five of said parish be discontinued.

Resolved, That, whereas, some of the citizens in the foregoing wards may desire to continue dipping, that in that event the Police Jury will furnish all material necessary to repair and maintain such vats and will be borne by the citizens in the neighborhood desiring to continue the dipping of their cattle.

The following letter from Mr. J. J. Bogard was received:

Benton, La., July 12, 1920.

To the President and Members of the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, Louisiana,

Gentlemen: Wish to kindly call your attention to the waste water flowing from the city of Benton, Louisiana, which waste water seems to have been drained so as to pass through my lot.

As said waste emanating from said drain is both an injury to my property and as to health, would therefore kindly ask you to give this your attention at your earliest opportunity, so that I may be relieved of this nuisance as to pass along the public highway, and thereby relieving my property of same.

The above matter was referred to Mr. Wilbourn, Police Jury for Ward Two, with authorization that he do whatever he considers necessary to remedy the matter.

The time having arrived, as previously fixed by ordinance of the Police Jury, for opening, canvassing and tabulating the returns of the ballot boxes held in Road District No. 1, the Police Jury resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of opening the ballot boxes, collecting the returns, canvassing the returns and declaring the result of the aforesaid election, whereas, pursuant to the ordinance received and adopted by the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, on the 11th day of May, A. D. 1920, ordering an election to take the sense of the property tax on both an injury to my property and as to health, would therefore kindly ask you to give this your attention at your earliest opportunity, so that I may be relieved of this nuisance as to pass along the public highway, and thereby relieving my property of same.

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
