Police Jury Proceedings

The Police Jury of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, met in Benton this day, Tuesday, March 1, 1921, pursuant to call of its President (this meeting to take the place of the regular meeting to be had on March 8, 1921) with all members present at roll call, viz: G. T. Mays, President; R. E. McDade, W. B. Wilbourn, E. M. Coyle, R. D. Whittington and J. G. McDade.

The minutes of the meeting had on January 11th and February 15th were read in open session and approved as read.

On motion and second, duly carried, the motion passed and of record of date February 15, 1921, appropriating \$4100 for dipping cattle in Wards One, Two and Six, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

On motion and second, duly carried, the balance of about \$4100, shown in the budget for the year of 1920, appropriated for tick eradication, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the said purpose for the year 1921, for the entire parish.

On application a pass across the Traffic Bridge at Bossier City was ordered issued to Rev. F. W. Tinnin, Pastor Baptist Church at Bossier City.

On application the name of Harrison McClinton was ordered to be put on the paupers' list, appropriation to begin as of January 1, 1921, and remittance of same to be sent to S. S. Rounsavall, Adner.

The following resolution was presented and unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved, That the Bank of Benton deliver to R. B. Hill, Clerk of the Police Jury, the \$16,000 worth of Liberty Bonds in its possession, which are the property of the Traffic Bridge of Bossier Parish, that he may deliver the same to the American National Bank of Shreveport, to be held by it as collateral security for overdraft of the Bossier Parish Bridge Fund account.

The following ordinance was unanimously adopted:

AN ORDINANCE
Ordering an election in Road District No. 2 of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, as was created by the Police Jury of said parish on April 13, 1915, to take the sense of the property taxpayers of said district, on the question of levying a special 5-mill tax for a period of five years, beginning with the year 1921, and ending with the year 1925, inclusive, for the purpose of building, constructing and repairing bridges, and building, repairing and maintaining public roads in said Road District No. 2 of Bossier Parish, Louisiana.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, in legal and special

session convened, That, under the authority of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and pursuant thereto, a special election is hereby ordered to be held in Road District No. 2 of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, as now created, on Tuesday, April 26, 1921, to take the sense of the property taxpayers, qualified to vote at such election, as provided by law, on the question of levying annually a special road tax of 5 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all assessable property in Road District No. 2, for the period of five years, beginning with the year 1921 and ending with and including the year 1925, and according to law.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the purpose for which this said tax is voted and levied and the use for which said proceeds are to be used are declared to be: For the purpose of building, constructing and repairing bridges and building, repairing and maintaining public roads in Road District No. 2 of Bossier Parish, Louisiana.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That said election be held at Bellevue, Haughton, Keyser, Adner, the regular polling places in said district, as now established by law, on Tuesday, April 26, 1921.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That said election be held under the general election laws of the State of Louisiana, except as hereinafter modified.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the ballots to be used in said election may be printed or written and shall read: "For a 5-mill special road tax for a period of five years," or "against a 5-mill special road tax for a period of five years."

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That all legal voters who are property taxpayers in said district shall be entitled to vote.

Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That notice of election herein called shall be given by proclamation of the President of the Police Jury, and published for thirty clear days in the official Journal of Bossier Parish, as required by law, and that said proclamation shall set forth that this Police Jury will meet in open session on the 10th day of May, 1921, being the day for a regular meeting, at the Court House, in the town of Benton, Bossier Parish, Louisiana, and will then and there proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots, in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of the election, and such meeting of the Police Jury for said purpose is hereby called.

Sec. 8. Be it further ordained, etc., That the returns of said election shall be made to the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, at its meeting on May 10, 1921, on which date the canvass of said returns will be had as aforementioned.

Sec. 9. Be it further ordained, etc., That the following commissioners and clerks are hereby appointed to hold said election:

Precinct 1, Bellevue—L. C. Biggs, F. E. Biggs and J. R. Stalder, commissioners; F. F. Vickers, Clerk.

Precinct 2, Haughton—L. H. Padgett, J. E. Hall and D. E. Alford, commissioners; R. M. Sandiford, clerk.

Precinct 3, Koran—J. C. Palmer, T. J. Brown and W. E. Pease, commissioners; L. R. Sapp, clerk.

Precinct 4, Adner—A. W. Finat, S. S.
