Bad Black Shot by Officer.

Monday morning City Marshal Hucksby arrested Coons Cannon, a negro, on the theft of a shotgun and pistol from a Bossier citizen. The negro made several attempts to get away from Mr. Hucksby and finally it was found necessary to make use of the police force to get him down. He was then placed in Deputy N. A. Yarbrough's car to be taken to Benton and jailed. Still attempting to play "game," the negro jumped from the car and started to run. Mr. Yarbrough caught him, but, using his hands as a weapon, the negro struck him, knocking him back and the fender of the car, and turned to flee. Mr. Hucksby then fired upon the negro, wounding him in the hip. A doctor was called and the negro was sent to a Shreveport hospital, where he is being guarded until he is well enough to be transferred to the Parish Jail at Benton.
Now a much graver charge will stand against him, for when Mr. Yarbrough was crouching against the fender of his car two of his ribs were broken. Mr. Hucksby was hurt, though the black's strong arm seemed to be to hurt him seriously, if possible.

One day last week Officers Bush, Hucksby and Yarbrough were called to the residence of Mrs. Ely, a negro, who assured them Allen Jefferson, another negro, was carrying a gun and attempting to assault him. There is usually a cause for such scraps, and the officers investigated, with the result of finding a neat still hidden under the wagon bank, with whiskey and mash, proving its present usage. Will Jeter and Allen Jefferson acknowledged the ownership of the establishment. They are now in the Parish Jail, awaiting trial, with the charge of operating a still and having whiskey under the wagon bank.
During the past ten days the Bossier City officers have run down five such offenders, all operating near town. That's the way to stop the business—just break up the factory plants.

Body of White Infant Found.

Last Friday morning some Italians, on their way to work in their market gardens, were attracted by a bundle in the weeds near the river bank. Investigation showed the bundle to contain the partially decomposed body of a white infant that appeared to have been there several days. Coroner Carter was summoned, viewed the body and ordered it buried.
The only clue to the identity of the child, or the person who placed it there, is the faded quilt in which it was wrapped, and footprints found near the body. The local officers are determined to run down every clue and apprehend the guilty parties, if possible.

At this time the Louisiana Tax Commission will review the values fixed by the Assessor and the Parish Board of Equalization, and will fix values for assessment purposes.

AN ORDINANCE

Ordering an election in Ward Three of the Parish of Bossier, State of Louisiana, as previously created by the Police Jury of said parish, to take the sense of the property taxpayers on the question of levying a special 5-mill tax for the period of five years, beginning with the year 1922 and ending with the year 1926, inclusive, for the purpose of building, constructing and repairing bridges and building, repairing and maintaining public roads in said Ward Three of Bossier Parish, Louisiana.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Bossier Parish, in legal and special session convened, That, under the authority of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and pursuant thereto, a special election is hereby ordered to be held in Ward Three of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, on Saturday, August 5, 1922, to take the sense of the property taxpayers qualified to vote at such election, as provided by law, on the question of levying annually a special road tax of 5 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all assessable property in Ward Three, for the period of five years, beginning with 1922 and ending with and including the year 1926, and according to law.
Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the purpose for which said tax is levied and the use for which said proceeds is to be used is declared to be: For the purpose of building, constructing and repairing bridges and building and repairing and maintaining public roads in said Ward Three.
Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That said election be held at Plain Dealing, Alden Bridge and Lakeport, the regular polling places in said ward, as now established by law, on Saturday, August 5, 1922.
Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That said election be held under the general election laws of the State of Louisiana, except as hereinafter modified.
Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the ballots to be used may be printed or written, and shall read: "For a 5-mill special road tax for the period of five years."
Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That all legal voters who are property taxpayers in said ward shall be entitled to vote.
Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That the returns of said election shall be made to the Police Jury of Bossier Parish within the time prescribed by law.
Sec. 8. Be it further ordained, etc., That the returns of said election be made to the Police Jury at its regular meeting to be held August 8, 1922, and they will then and there open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, canvass the returns and declare the result of said election.
Sec. 9. Be it further ordained, etc., That the following commissioners and clerks are hereby appointed to hold said election: Alden Bridge—S. R. Strayhan, A. B. Winham and J. J. Swindle, commissioners; I. F. Elder, clerk.
Lakeport—W. H. Brockman, R. A. King and Odette Gore, commissioners; G. G. Brown, clerk.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

In accordance with an ordinance adopted by the Police Jury on the 27th day of June, 1922, notice is hereby given that an election will be held in Ward Three of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, as previously created by the Police Jury of said parish, on Saturday, the 5th day of August, 1922, at which time there shall be submitted to the property taxpayers, qualified electors in said ward, a proposition to vote a 5-mill special road tax for a period of five years, beginning with the year 1922 and ending with the year 1926, inclusive, for the purpose of building, constructing and repairing bridges and building, repairing and maintaining public roads in said Ward Three of Bossier Parish, Louisiana, as fully set forth in an ordinance duly adopted and passed by said Police Jury in open and legal session convened, which ordinance is made part of this proclamation, and is as follows, to-wit:
