Senator Weber has wooed, and won a most estimable young lady, and we doubt not he will prove a worthy husband. It is our sincere hope that they may enjoy a long life of unclouded happiness.

By perusa of the minutes of last week's session of the Common Council, it will be ascertained that the town fathers have very wisely adopted the same resolutions in regard to the river ferry that were passed by the Police Jury, requiring the lessee to furnish steam tug, etc., and fixing a new tariff of ferriage for passengers, vehicles and cattle. This will enable ope man or firm to purchase and operate both the town and parish ferry, thus adding greatly to the convenience of persons crossing from this side of the river to the other. The establ shment of this ferry will supply a need that has been long felt, and we congratulate Mesers. Bourgeois & Lavaux, the Police Jury and Town Council upon their action in proposing and making the improvement practicable.

SUGAR LUMPS. -The most remarkable yield of sugar which has yet been reported in Ascension has been realized upon the plantation of Mesers. M. D. Bringier & Co., who made 60 hogsheads from the cane raised upon a tract of land measuring about 19 arpents, being an average of more than three hogsheads to the arpent. This equals the product of the best sugar lands in the fertile Teche region, and is, we believe, beyond precedent in this section.

From a number of plantations the yield is reported as one hogshead per acre from rattoon and two from plant cane, while others are doing much better. The general average will reach mearly, if not quite, two hogsheads. Our sugar planters are gratified with the prospect before them, and we trust their expectations of a fine crop and good market will be fully realized.

The body of Henry Smith, the young man who fell from the steamer Seminole Taesday morning of last week, was recovered about six miles down the river, opposite one of Mr. John Burnside's places, and taken ashore. Coroner Cantrelle being sent for, repaired to the spot and held an inquest, and at the request of friends of the deceased had the body temporarily buried on the river bank, from whence it was next day uncarthed and carried to Algiers for final interment. The comments upon this affair by the New Orleans Times, in its issue of Thursday, wherein the Coroner is severely criticised for the rude and incomplete manner in which the body was buried on the river bank. are quite unjust, inasmuch as Mr. Cantrelle merely followed the wishes of friends of the young man in placing the remains as he did where they could be easily and expeditiously disinterred for shipment by boat to Al-

We learn that a prominent merchant is circulating for signatures a petition to Governor Kellogg for the promulgation of the act passed at the last session of the General Assembly providing a new form of government for the town of Donaldsonville, and relieving town property from the imposition of taxes by the parish authorities. It is said that the parties moving in this matter do not desire the new charter to become a permanency, as they are opposed to many of its provisions, but wish it promulgated with the hope of securing certain amendments from the next General Assembly. Adopting the views expressed by a friend, we would suggest that this plan may not result as its originators anticipate, and that a much better method of accomplishing the objects in view would be to prepare a new form of charter, embodying the desirable provisions of the old and omitting those which are obnoxious, and trust to our Representatives in the coming Assembly to secure its enactment into law. Unless the parties referred to prefer the unsigned charter to the one now in force, they had best not present their petition, which may be the means of brining upon them just what they are seeking to avoid.
