Esra Cornell, best known to the public as founder of Cornell University, at Ithaca, New York, the leading one of this country, died at Ithica on the 10th inst. Mr. Cornell was born in Westchester county N. Y., in 1807, and was nearly 68 years old at the time of his disease. His parents were poor, and during his youth he had few opportunities for salf-improvement in the way of schools or books. He died the possessor of a vast fortune, mostly accumulathed in the business of telegraphy, he early becoming a large owner of stack in the great companies in the centry. His real estate speculations always proved remunerative and helped his fortune. Uneducated himsers, he experienced throughout his life the disadvantages of his conditions and resolved that something should be done for others in this direction. Soon after Congress made rection. 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
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
