Republican Rally at Crevasse Settlement.

A Republican meeting and torch-light parade occurred in the fifth ward, at Crevasse Settlement, last Saturday evening, in accordance with previous announcement.

The indications for a large assemblage of people at the Dutch Stores last Sunday were not disappointed, but the expectations of a pleasant and successful Republican meeting were.

The Republican of the sixth ward will select their candidates for Justices and Constables to-day or to-morrow.

The Democratic Campaign.

We have received meagre information concerning the Democratic meeting at McCall's warehouse Saturday night.

The D. S. C. B. Hall having been engaged by Mr. Keating, the regular meeting of the Tilden and Nicholls club did not take place last Saturday night.

A club meeting was held at Allemania store, first ward, Saturday afternoon.

Another meeting will be held in the first ward to-morrow, and the aid of the Independent Band will be invoked to rally the faithful and the doubtful.

The "Independent" movement is coming to a focus, and will probably culminate in the announcement of a ticket during the coming week.

Although Mr. N. H. Wilson is still the ostensible leader, it is evident that wiser heads and subtler minds than his are directing and controlling the scheme.

PARISH COURT.—The following cases have been considered by Parish Judge Maher during the past two weeks, and disposed of as indicated:

CRIMINAL MATTERS. Oscar Major, charged with larceny of goods from C. Boudreau, asked for trial by jury and was remanded to appear before the District Court.

In the case of Wm. Scott, arraigned upon a charge of assault and battery, the District Attorney pro tem. entered a nolle proes.

Nathan Patterson, accused of assault and battery, was discharged.

Geo. Denis, on a like charge, was adjudged guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 or suffer ten days' imprisonment.

Nathan Hayes was also arraigned for assault and battery, and being deemed guilty by the court, was asked to contribute \$2 50 to the parish treasury, which he did.

Julien Theodore goes before the District Court, preferring to have the charge against him submitted to the arbitration of a jury.

S. Peterson is accused of maliciously killing a horse, and the matter will be investigated on Monday.

CIVIL MATTERS. In the case of Caroline Harris vs. her husband, suit for divorce, judgment by default was rendered in favor of plaintiff and subsequently confirmed.

Harriet Williams obtained judgment of \$1 50 against James Teller and wife for wages.

In the suit of Aug. Porche vs. Fred. Baker, judgment by default was rendered against defendant, as also in the case of Rose Adams vs. Octave Mollere.

The application of Meyer Lemann for a monition was confirmed.
