SHALL WE HAVE A BRIDGE?

Proposed Formation of a Stock Company to Bridge Bayou Lafourche at Donald-sonville-Call for a Meeting of Interested Citizens.

A movement has been quietly inaugurated here recently, looking to the accomplishment of a much needed work of public improvement: the building of a bridge for the accommodation of vehicles and pedestrians, across the Bayou Lafourche at this point. Last week a gentleman who feels considerable interest in the matter prepared the following list of prominent citizens to be used in the act of incorporation:

Landry on Sunday, and the following day he introduced "Senate bill No. 165, to incorporate the Donaldsonville Bridge Company," which was referred to the committee on corporations, favorably reported upon, and finally passed on Wednesday. Unfortunately, however, the end of the session was so near at hand that consideration of the bill was not secured in the House of Representatives, and it failed to become a law.

While the passage of the measure would doubtless have imparted some impetus to the bridge movement, its failure need in no wise impede the prosecution of the good work. There is a general State law which empowers Police Juries and Town Councils to grant to individuals or stock companies the privilege of constructing toll bridges, said Juries or Councils to prescribe the tolls. The only drawback to this method is that the priv-Mrs. Louisa Wiese died suddenly liege can not be granted for a longer period than ten years, but once obtained and the work begun, it would be a very easy matter to procure the passage of a special act by the General Assembly at any session, extending the charter to such time as might be desirable.
