Items of Louisiana News.

Cleanings from the Press.

Colfax Chronicle: Sam. M. Morgan, an old and highly respected citizen of this parish, died at his residence last Tuesday.

Tangipahoa Independent: Tuesday night, just above Johnson Station, in Iberville county, Miss. two unknown white men, supposed to be tramps, were run over by a passing train and instantly killed.

Concordia Eagle: Jesse Walker, colored, who was found guilty of the murder of Violet Simmons in Union parish, on the 19th day of February last, was executed at Farmerville on the 10th inst.

Assumption Pioneer: A little son of Mr. Marcelin Bourg, aged four years, was drowned in front of the Valence plantation. Two of his companions about the same age made a brave but futile effort to rescue him.

W. Baton Rouge Sugar Planter: The lightning last Saturday struck one of the cabins on the old Stewart place, injuring a colored man sleeping therein, setting fire to his bedding and scattering things around considerably. His wife, who was sleeping with him at the time, had to be pulled from the bed to prevent her from burning up.

Iberia Sugar-Bowl: Judge Fontelleu and District Attorney Merchant were compelled to appear before the Supreme Court in New Orleans, in answer to a writ of mandamus. We believe this grew out of their efforts, coupled with those of Clerk Segura and Deputy Sheriff Veazey, to prevent the citation of witnesses in the trial of Judge Fontelleu for ineligibility.

Lafayette Advertiser: During a heavy storm of thunder, lightning, rain, hail and wind, Sunday night, the wind overturned or seriously damaged over thirty buildings and prostrated much fencing near Careno westward a few miles. One man had a thigh broken and was otherwise bruised, and several children were also hurt, but not seriously.

Madison Journal: On the ferryboat P. F. Geisse, yesterday morning as she was lying at her landing in Vicksburg, the engineer, Edward Costello, was brutally murdered by Thomas Joice, the fireman of the boat. Joice knocked Mr. Costello down, and taking his pistol from his pocket, beat him in the head until Costello's brains oozed out. The murderer was arrested.

E. Feliciana Pat. Dem.: The death of the little negro Emma Hickly, upon whose body an inquest was recently held, undoubtedly arose from strangulation caused by her falling and fastening her head between the bed rail and the chair upon which she was standing, and not from any foul means. The house of Dr. Felix DeLee, in Port Hudson, was struck by lightning and considerably damaged.

St. Charles Mirror: There is a rumor to the effect that ex-Gov. Hahn will be appointed by the President Minister to the Central American States. The appointment will be received with much satisfaction by the Governor's friends in this parish. The Supreme Court dismissed appeal in the case of Wm. Harris, convicted of rape at the recent term of Court and sentenced to imprisonment in the penitentiary for life.

St. Mary Enterprise: Sunday night, a woman living at the Orphan's Home plantation attempted to light a fire by pouring coal oil on the coals. The flames of the burning oil completely enveloped her body, and burned her beyond recovery. Last Sunday, Mr. Loeb of Cyrennot, while bathing in Cote Blanche Bay, leaped from the wharf and was instantly drowned. His body was recovered.

Morehouse Clarion: Saturday evening our parish was visited by the most severe and destructive wind known for many years. In the upper portion of the parish some three or four gin houses were blown down, cabins unroofed; and in other sections the damage was confined principally to blowing down fencing. All over our parish the bad worm has done considerable damage to the corn and sweet potato crops.

Morgan City Register: Mr. R. B. Lawrence brought to our office a few specimens of grasshoppers which have appeared on his place in great numbers and are devouring the potato and beet crops. Mr. Lawrence informs us that he is satisfied they are the same that destroyed crops in Texas and Kansas for a year or two past. While Jock Wildenstein, a merchant in Jeanerette, was quietly sitting on the gallery of his store last Friday, during a thunder storm, smoking his pipe, a flash of lightning struck the pipe and knocked it into pieces, but did not injure Mr. Wildenstein in the least.

Franklin Sun: Last Sunday Mr. Jas. Gorman, who lived about four miles from this place, on the Delhi road, was killed by his step-daughter, Sallie Bryant, a girl about fourteen years of age. The girl stated at the inquest that her step-father has, on several occasions since her mother's death, forced her to cohabit with him, using the lash at one time and threatening to kill her at another. She and her brothers left his house and he followed them and whipped them back. Last Sunday he attempted again to force her to cohabit with him, but she escaped from him and afterwards returning and finding him asleep, she shot him the entire load of shot passing through his heart. The coroner's jury returned a finding of justifiable homicide. A farmer living a few miles from town, had eight head of hogs killed by a stroke of lightning last Sunday evening, during the storm. The hogs were in a bed at the foot of a tree which was struck by lightning.


