HOME AGAIN.—Our popular young friend, Mr. A. J. Reynolds, returned from his vacation jaunt three weeks ago and was welcomed back by a legion of friends, who had missed his genial presence from his customary haunts in the social circles of our lively town and vicinity. Mr. Reynolds has resumed his duties as foreman of the CHIEF establishment, and is fully authorized to transact any business connected therewith during the proprietor's absence.

The editor has been this week busily employed as Clerk of Court, in preparing belated transcripts in appealed cases, which, together with a rush of job work in the printing office that could not be put off, has delayed this issue of the CHIEF beyond its proper day of publication. In consideration of the circumstances, we confidently expect our readers to excuse our tardiness and to overlook any imperfections that may have crept into this number of the paper.

PHENIX FAIR POSTPONED.—Owing to the continued prevalence of bad weather the committee of arrangements have wisely determined to postpone a post-ponement of the fair for the benefit of Phenix Fire Company that has been advertised to take place to-day and tomorrow. As soon as good weather sets in, a date will be fixed for the entertainment, of which due notice will be given. The concert will take place this evening, pursuant to announcement. The raffle of the life-sized doll, in which every holder of a concert ticket is entitled to participate, will take place at Cheap Tony's store, on Sunday next.

The Baton Rouge mail packet Morning Star missed connection with the daily train on two days during the present week, but no blame can be attached in the premises, as every boat on the river was delayed by the exceedingly heavy fogs that prevailed. When such steamers as the Robt. E. Lee occupied eight hours in making the run from New Orleans to Donaldsonville, it is not to be wondered at that the little Star should be behind time. She is "on deck" all right again, and reaches here every day a few minutes past 11, allowing her passengers ample time to enjoy a good dinner at the hotel before taking the train for New Orleans.

STEAR SUGARS.—Mr. J. T. Nolan, Jr., finished grinding last Saturday, in accordance with expectation. We hope to receive a report of his yield in season for next Saturday's paper.

We are informed that grinding will cease at Mr. D. F. Kenner's Bowden place to-day. There is still some cane in the field, but it will scarcely give sufficient sugar at the present rate of yield to cover the cost of manufacture.

The total crop of Mr. Burnside's Ascension plantation is reported to us at 760 hogsheads, averaging about 1150 giving a total of 874,000 pounds of sugar. As we have before stated, this is the largest crop made on the place since the war.

Gen. Allen Thomas will realize about 400 hds. on his New Hope plantation. We have heard the crop of the McCall places—Evan Hall and the Richard McCall plantation—amounted at 1,000,000 pounds. With favorable weather the yield of these two places would have been nearly, if not quite, 2,000,000 pounds.

An accident occurred to the mill in Lemann & Lum's Palo Alto place, last week, but it was thought that, by exercising care, the remainder of the crop could be ground without stopping to repair the break. The manager expected to finish grinding Tuesday night.

The sugar-house whistles whose tooting was heard on Friday last week were those of Mr. Aaron Jacobs' Stella place and Mr. Burnside's Riveron.

There will be very little sugar made after this week.

POLICE JURY.—An important adjourned meeting of this body was held at the Court-House on Tuesday, at which business of considerable moment was transacted, as will appear from the official proceedings published in another column. The action looking to repair of weak places in the Port Barrow and Bayou Lafourche levees is timely and it is to be hoped the Overseers of Roads and Levees will promptly and conscientiously perform the duties imposed upon them in connection with this matter.

The munificent salary of \$100 a year awarded to the Parish Physician as compensation for his professional services to prisoners and paupers may have the effect of so swelling Dr. Vandegriff with the pernicious "pride of riches" that common people can approach him only with trepidation—and then again, it may have an effect quite the contrary.

The resolutions looking to the adjustment and liquidation of the old parish debt bespeak a bona fide intention on the part of our parochial legislators to place Ascension in line with neighboring parishes, all of which, we believe, have squared up their old debts and are doing business on a "pay as you go" basis with clean balance sheets. We have no doubt the holders of old claims and judgments against the parish will agree to terms of settlement advantageous to parochial interests. The movement looking to the wiping out of the parish debt will be greatly facilitated by a strict performance of duty on the part of the District Attorney under the resolution instructing him to proceed to the collection, by legal process before the District Court, of all back taxes and licenses. Delinquents who defer a settlement until these proceedings are instituted will find themselves taxed with heavy penalties and costs in addition to the original amounts due. Those who are wise will take the hint and settle at the earliest possible moment.

The Police Jury will meet again on the 15th of February to prepare a schedule of parish licenses for the current year.

Proceedings of the Police Jury, Parish of Ascension. SPECIAL MEETING. PARISH OF ASCENSION, Jan. 13, 1881.

The regular meeting of the Police Jury appointed for the 11th instant having failed for the want of a quorum, a called meeting was held this day.

Present—Messrs. R. T. Hanson, President; Mathias Rodriguez, Pierre Klopman, Henry C. Brand and Ben. Gibson.

The President presented a letter addressed to the Police Jury of the parish of Ascension by Henry B. Richardson, Chief State Engineer, calling their attention to the condition of public levees in this parish, especially those on the Bayou Lafourche, and for some miles below it, and stating that their action and authority will be required for the prevention and repair of reventments, road cuts, rice flames and other defects in the levees, before any other rise of the rivers. The Secretary was thereupon required to direct the Overseers of Roads and Levees, especially those of the 2nd and 4th wards, to make a thorough inspection of the roads and levees in their respective wards and report without delay to the President of the Police Jury.

Mr. Ernest Poedelaux's resignation of the office of Overseer of Roads and Levees, dated Oct. 14, 1880, was accepted.

On motion of Mr. Pierre Klopman, the President was authorized to name the members of the committee appointed to examine the books and accounts of the Secretary and Parish Treasurer, and who are instructed to report at the next meeting.

On motion, 2d ward, it was Resolved, That members of the Governor's Jury shall henceforth be paid not more than two dollars each for any one request.

On motion of Mr. Pierre Klopman, it was Resolved, That for his services as Parish and Jail Physician, when called upon by the proper authorities, the Governor shall receive one hundred dollars per annum, payable on his own warrant.

On motion of Mr. Pierre Klopman it was Resolved, That from and after the 1st day of May, 1881, all approved parishes of 150 shall be paid out of the surplus contingent fund of 1880.

That the Finance Committee be and they are hereby directed to examine into and ascertain the amount of the old Parish debt, and to report thereon to the committee prior to 1881. Also to ascertain the best possible means of coming to an understanding with the creditors of the parish, for the liquidation of the same.

On motion of Mr. Henry C. Brand, it was Resolved, That the Police Jury adjourn until the 15th day of February, 1881, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of adopting a house ordinance for the present year.
