Alcée Solomon was before Justice Leche this week charged with stealing a skiff belonging to the Lafourche saw-mill. Accused was released on bond.

The steamer Ed. Richardson takes the place of the burned Lee in the Vicksburg and New Orleans trade and made her first trip this week, passing up Tuesday night.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy obtained the contract for rebuilding the Arizona levee in the parish of Iberville. We learn from the Iberville South that he has begun work with a force of sixty men.

The contract for building the Dugas-Gandin levee in this parish has been awarded to Mr. D. L. Stanton, who will put a force of men at work on the job next Monday. The new levee is to be from 650 to 700 feet long.

The favorite Bayou Sara packet, Jno. W. Cannon came out of her summer quarters this week looking as bright as a new silver dollar, and has resumed her place in the trade where she has earned such an enviable reputation.

A beautiful view of the large comet that daily appears in the eastern sky can be had about 5 o'clock in the morning. The sight is well worth getting up early to see. The comet is heading towards the sun and is rapidly approaching its perihelion.

Antoine Ourso, Jr., a boy about 10 years of age, was found in an insensible condition in one of the ditches of his father's farm on Bayou Lafourche, and it is believed he was bitten by a poisonous snake. The boy died yesterday and was buried to-day.

Steps are being taken for the establishment of a Democratic club in Donaldsonville. A preliminary meeting was held at the office of Capt. E. P. Landry one evening this week, and the club will be permanently organized during the coming week.

Our neighbors Mr. and Mrs. Dominique Varien have had the misfortune to lose a charming little daughter aged about 2 1/2 years. This is not the first time they have sustained such a bereavement, and we sympathize sincerely with them in their affliction.

We regret to learn that Mr. Antoine Sanchez, section boss on the Texas Pacific railroad and a resident of Port Barrow, is very low with an attack of malarial fever. We hope he will pass the crisis of the disease safely and soon regain his health.

The work of grading for the Mississippi Valley railroad is proceeding rapidly on the left bank of the river, and at last accounts the large force of convicts employed in the labor had almost reached College Point. They will soon be working in Ascension.

We republish the minutes of the last meeting of the Common Council to supply an omission. In the copy furnished us by the Secretary he failed to insert a statement of the bills approved, and did not discover the omission until after the proceedings appeared in the paper.

Messrs. Bernard and Lévy Lemaun, composing the firm of B. Lemaun & Bro., arrived home this week after spending the summer in the North and West. Friend Myer is in his usual health and looks as hearty as a buck, but we regret to learn that his brother is somewhat under the weather. While the Messrs. Lemaun were away they favored the Chief occasionally with copies of Western papers, for which courteous remembrance they have our thanks.

District Court is in session in St. James and District Attorney Earhart has a large criminal docket to wreathe with. A friend promised to furnish us a statement of the cases disposed of during the week, but he has evidently forgotten us. It isn't the first time his memory has failed him in this respect. We shall have to discharge him and employ a more reliable reporter.

BASE BALL.—The Nolans of Donaldsonville succeeded in making their anticipated trip to Plaquemine last Sunday, and played a very enjoyable game with the P. Vignot club of that town, the champion nine of Iberville parish. The match was played on a splendid field on the batture just across the river from Plaquemine, and was witnessed by a large crowd of people, who were much interested in the sport and heartily applauded all good plays. We hope the Vignots and Nolans will cross bats many a time in the future and that their friendly contests will always be as amicable and satisfactory as the two they have had up to this date. Not much.

Sunday, October 22nd has been fixed as the day on which the base ball match between the Nolans of Donaldsonville and our parish team, the Alexandria nine is to come off. All the necessary arrangements are being made to give the boys of Ascension a grand reception.

And this is from the People: The 22nd of October next is the day definitely decided on for the match game for one hundred dollars and the championship between Donaldsonville and Alexandria. The Donaldsonville boys may rest assured that every thing possible will be done to assure the range of defeat that would befall them, and that they will be accorded a full measure of that magnanimity for which Rapadians are characteristic.

If these extracts indicate the feeling of the Alexandria players—and we have no doubt such is the fact—it will be seen that they have a idea of sustaining defeat at the hands of the Nolans. Our boys must play their best material to Alexandria and play their best game if they hope to win. That they will be given a royal reception is a foregone conclusion, and we know it will detract nothing from the hospitality or fraternal good will of the gallant Red river boys if our ball tossers win the coveted title of "champions" and pocket the \$100 which the merchants of Alexandria offer to any club outside of New Orleans that will defeat the Rapides picked nine. The superintendent of the Texas Pacific railroad has kindly consented to furnish the Nolans and their friends excursion tickets for the trip to Alexandria and return at \$25 each, and the excursion party will number from twenty to twenty-five persons if the Nolans win the game, they will apply the \$100 to the payment of the expense of their excursion.

Weather permitting the Nolans will go to Alexandria to-morrow afternoon to play the Valence, and the L. E. Bentleys and J. A. Keatings will cross bats in Donaldsonville.

The Congressional Campaign.

Progress of the Kellogg Campaign in the Parish of Ascension. Senator Kellogg and his campaign party are meeting with the most gratifying success in their tour of the district. They have addressed large mass-meetings at Plaquemine, Bayou Goula, Donaldsonville, Scatterry grove, Painscourtville, Napoleonville, and Labadieville, and at every point the people have turned out en masse to hear the arguments of the Republican speakers. The effect has been to strengthen the cause of the Republican nominee very greatly and to demoralize almost completely the small following that Judge Beattie had in the section visited. All classes of fair minded observers now freely admit that Gov. Kellogg will receive the great mass of the Republican vote of Iberville, Ascension and Assumption, and besides this he will be supported by a large proportion of those citizens who do not actively participate in politics, but who cast their ballots for the men and measures they believe best calculated to advance the public interests. In addition to the masses of Republicans who have gathered at the Kellogg meetings, Conservatives and Democrats have attended in goodly numbers and seemed to find much to approve in the matter and manner of the Republican canvass. If the regular nominee and his friends meet with the same success in the other end of the district that has attended them in this, Senator Kellogg's election by a heavy plurality will be assured. We believe that Judge Beattie will get as many Democratic votes as Republican, and that Senator Kellogg will have a clear majority over Mr. Aellen and Judge Beattie combined.

SUGAR ROLLING BEGUN.—The grinding season has opened and a number of sugar-houses have commenced operations. The first in this parish to get underway, we believe, was that of Messrs. McCall Bros., on their splendid Evan Hall plantation, one of the finest in the State. Here steam was raised and the manufacture of sugar begun on Monday.

Mr. James Teller's mill was started the same day; that of Mrs. M. Israel & Co., on their Sausburg place in St. James, on Tuesday; that of Mr. Ben Tereaud on Wednesday, and that of Mr. Scouring Taylor's St. Emma place on Thursday. The mills on Messrs. Leouann & Lamo's Palo Alto place and Mr. H. S. Backner's Crescent place are also running, but we have not learned what day they started.

On the Ascension, Clark, Conway and Orange Grove pieces of Mr. Oliver Biernie—commonly known as the Burnside plantations—the sugar-house will be started next Tuesday, and on the Donaldson place, belonging to the same gentleman, the work will begin a week later.

No sugar will be made on the Riverton place this season, as the greater portion of the cane crop was destroyed by the overflow and seed will have to be borrowed from the other places of the Burnside group to finish out the planting for next year's crop.

The prospect for a good sugar yield is very encouraging. We shall be under obligations to planters, or any readers of the Chief employed on sugar plantations who will send us such items concerning the progress of the work of sugarmaking as may be of interest.

A grand complimentary anniversary ball will be given next Wednesday evening, the 11th inst., by Hope Hook and Ladder Company of Plaquemine, and the members of Ascension Hook and Ladder Company have received an invitation to attend. We have been requested to mention this fact and to say that those who desire to take advantage of the courtesy may do so without further notice, as it will be impracticable to hold a special meeting of the company to consider the invitation. All who conclude to go may be sure of having an enjoyable time.

Mr. Henry Cook closed his ice-house on the 1st instant. His stock of ice had been exhausted about two weeks before, but he kept his customers supplied by obtaining semi-weekly shipments from New Orleans. The season has been a good one for the ice business and although Mr. Cook had a larger quantity than ever before he had no trouble in selling it off. Next year he will probably lay in a still heavier stock.
