In the face of the fact that the average price of the principal farm products has increased from 300 to 400 per cent. within the past sixty years, while leading manufactured articles used by farmers has decreased from 20 to 90 per cent. during the same period, the Indianapolis Journal marvels how it can be contended that protection does not ultimately benefit the consumer.

PARISH BOARD OF HEALTH.—At the session of this body held on the 8th inst., resolutions were adopted expressing the deep regret and most valued member, Dr. Edward Duffel. Reports were received from Dr. Hanson relative to small pox in Port Barrow and Snake Bend, from Dr. Love relative to six light cases of the disease on the Tareaud plantation, and from Dr. McGalliard relative to the vaccination of over 100 persons in Port Barrow and lower Snake Bend. Dr. McGalliard's bill for eighty-one successful vaccinations at \$1 each, was approved, and the Board adjourned to meet next Friday, the 22d inst., when an ordinance providing for the collection and compilation of statistics for Assession will be submitted. All the practicing physicians of the parish are invited to be present.

PARISH SCHOOL BOARD.—The Board of Schools Directors for this parish met at the Secretary's office on the 6th inst., and decided that the public schools should be opened on the first Monday of March. Messrs. E. N. Pugh, Dr. J. D. Hanson, J. A. Landry, and Dr. A. C. Love were appointed a committee to examine and accept or reject applicants for teachers' positions, February 29, at 11 o'clock a. m., at the Secretary's office being designated as the date, hour and place for the committee to meet for the examination of applicants. The committee appointed to carry with a similar committee from the Police Jury relative to the disposition of funds derived from the sale of property donated for educational purposes, was invested with full power to take such action as might be deemed advisable. Secretary Landry, who is also Parish Treasurer and custodian of the school fund, reported \$1805 16 on hand to the credit of that fund.

THE WORLD'S EXPOSITION.

The President and Board of Management of the World's Industrial and Cotton Centennial Exposition to be held at New Orleans have submitted an admirable scheme to the Governors of the various States and Territories looking to the organization of local associations with a view to forwarding the objects and securing the greater success of this important enterprise. We had intended publishing the plan at an earlier date, but have been unable to devote the necessary space thereto until the present time. After calling attention to the fact that the act of Congress creating the Exposition requires the appointment of State and Territorial Commissioners prior to the 1st of February, 1884, the following suggestions are made:

I. That the Governor of each State and Territory request the citizens of each county or parish to meet and form a permanent local organization for the purpose of collecting a thorough exhibit of the county or parish, and the distribution of the same.

II. Each county or parish organization should elect a chairman and such officers as may be required, and the same to be forwarded to the Governor, and by him to the Director General, to be commissioned by the President of the Exposition.

III. The State Commissioner should have general supervision of all local organizations, conduct all correspondence, and distribute information, in order to unify the varied interests of the State in a general and harmonious manner, and to make such report to the Governor of the State as he may require, and the Commissioner should be the medium of all communication with the Board of Management.

IV. There should be meetings of the county and parish organizations at least once a month for the purpose of forwarding the work and hearing reports of committees. The chairman, at each meeting, make a written report of progress of work to the State Commissioner, who should forward the same with suggestions, to the Director General.

V. In order to avoid confusion, a uniform system of naming the local organizations should be adopted, as for instance: County (or parish), World's Exposition Association.

VI. The Commissioner in each State and Territory should, in accordance with article 10 of the general regulations, communicate directly with the Director General of the Exposition, the Commissioner are thus defined:

"To make known throughout the State the rules and regulations of the Exposition, and to distribute the forms of application, and to receive, as well as other documents relating to the Exposition."

"To encourage and to organize the collective exhibition of groups of similar products of the State, and to solicit to the President the delegates charged with the representation and the exhibition of such products at the Exposition."

We sincerely hope that the parish of Assension will not be backward in lending its aid to the successful carrying out of this plan of local effort and organization, but that some of our enterprising and public spirited citizens will take hold of the matter at an early day and establish an "Assension parish World's Exposition Association" upon a practical basis that will arouse the general interest of our people and lead to a proper exhibit of our products alongside those of the other parishes of the State. We ought to make a first-class showing in sugar, our leading product, while the New River country can furnish samples of cotton comparing favorably with any grown in the South. Rice of superior quality is produced here, while corn, vegetables and fruits attain a degree of perfection on our river and back lands that gives Assension a high rank among the "garden parishes" of Louisiana. The moss and timber of our cypress swamps and of the section of the parish traversed by New River and skirted by Bayou Mandino and Amite are eminently worthy to be represented in the exhibit, and doubtless there are other articles not occurring to our mind at this moment which might form interesting and valuable features of a display that could not fail to redound to our credit and advantage.

Bills for the first installment of lumber to be used in the construction of the Exposition buildings have been received by the Board of Management, and the work is to be inaugurated at the earliest possible day, to be prosecuted thence without intermission until completed. With the assurances of co-operation already received from the States and Territories of our own country, from Mexico, Central America, South America, Africa and other foreign lands, the success of the Exposition is already placed almost beyond peradventure, and we should deeply regret a failure on the part of the parish of Assension to contribute its quota to the advancement of this great home enterprise.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

On Monday last thirty-four decisions in cases pending before the Supreme Court of Louisiana were rendered and read, among the number being a judgment on the appeal in the case of the Board of Wardens of the Congregation of the Roman Catholic Church of Assension vs. Right Rev. N. J. Porech, Archbishop, and Rev. F. X. Ceuppens, his agent. The main point at issue, as our readers will remember, was as to the right of District Judge Cheevers to revoke the order of recantation which he granted when the first proceedings in the controversy were instituted. Justice Fenner, who prepared and announced the decision of the Supreme Court, takes the ground that—

Appeal from the order of the judge a quo recanting his former voluntary recantation against the protest of a party, and after the recantation has been acted upon such order of recantation is inoperative.

This ruling confirms the position of the Wardens, who were the appellants, and unless reversed on rehearing, its effect will be to have the further proceedings in the case conducted before a Judge ad hoc, to which position Judge Cheevers had appointed F. B. Earhart, Esq., of the Assension bar. Of course the decision of the Supreme Court has no reference to the merits of the suit.

Another of the cases decided on Monday is one in which many of our local readers take considerable interest—the criminal libel suit of the State ex rel. Rev. Cyrien Venissat vs. D. Bienville et al., wherein Dr. Bienville was convicted in the District Court of Assension. The decision in this case was also rendered by Justice Fenner, who says: "In prosecutions for libel, proof of publication, libelous and unauthorized on its face, makes out a prima facie case for the State, establishes a presumption of legal malice. The burden of establishing justification is then thrown upon defendant.

REPUBLICANS UNITED.—The rival Republican parish committees met at Donaldsonville last Saturday afternoon, pursuant to call, the regular committee of the St. Peter school-room and the Hill committee of the court-house. Conference committees of seven from each body were appointed, who met in joint session and agreed upon the following plan for adjusting the differences in the party and securing a united organization, which was subsequently ratified by both parish committees:

That a joint committee shall be constituted, composed of six members, three from each division of the party represented by what are known as the Landry and Hill committees, and joint committee to have full power to call an election delegates to a parish convention to be held on the 23d inst. at 12 o'clock P. M., and that returns of the election shall be made to the joint committee.

On Thursday the appointment of Messrs. H. O. Maher, John Pettaway and Peter James as members of the proposed joint committee representing the Hill faction was announced, but before representatives of the Landry faction had been named another conference of leading Republicans from both wings of the party took place and a different plan of action was decided upon. Articles of agreement were drawn up in triplicate and signed by all the participants in the conference, but it was decided that the details should not be made public until the two parish committees shall have been convened and the scheme submitted for their approval. It can be stated, however, that the basis of the arrangement is that seventeen delegates shall be chosen by each parish organization, who together shall form the parish convention to elect delegates to the State, judicial and senatorial conventions and to nominate candidates for parochial offices. This convention is to meet next Saturday, the 23d inst., as soon as the Landry and Hill parish committees have ratified the proposed agreement, and at the conclusion of its other business the body will resolve itself into the new parish executive committee, to remain in existence the ensuing four years. The favor with which the plan has been received by both factions indicates that it will meet with an almost unanimous endorsement and that the Republicans of Assension will heal their long standing differences and go into the impending campaign with a united organization and but one ticket. Notices of the meeting of the Landry and Hill committees next Saturday appear among the new advertisements in to-day's Chief.

Democratic Executive Committee,
Parish of Assension.

DONALDSONVILLE, La., Feb. 12, 1884.

Pursuant to call the Democratic Executive Committee met this day at the committee room, Chairman H. L. Duffel in the chair. The roll was called by this, Israel, chosen to act as secretary pro tem. In the absence of the secretary, a quorum being present the chairman stated that the object of the meeting was for the purpose of choosing a delegate to the State Central Committee; thereupon Frederick Duffel was unanimously chosen as delegate from this parish.

On motion of G. Israel, duly seconded, the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, Under the constitution it devolves upon the Governor to appoint all officers whose appointments are not otherwise provided for, thereby focusing on his Excellency great responsibility in selecting persons who are competent to fill the various offices of the State; and

WHEREAS, It is deemed wise and expedient that the people have a voice in selecting their officers, that an effort be made in each ward of this parish, therefore

Resolved, That an election be held in each ward of this parish on the 23d inst., at 12 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of choosing competent persons for members of the State Central Committee, to be nominated by the parish executive committee, and that a certain number of the members of said election committee be appointed by the parish executive committee by the members of each ward to be forwarded by said committee as soon as possible to the Governor, with petition for appointment.

Resolved, That in case of any vacancy in the parish executive committee, or otherwise, that said appointment be recommended in the same manner by the parish executive committee after having obtained the consent of the parish executive committee by the members of each ward to be forwarded by the secretary to the Governor immediately.

Resolved, That whenever a vacancy shall occur in this committee, the same shall be filled by the committee at its first meeting after said vacancy shall have taken place or be made known to the committee.

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the secretary of this committee to obtain duplicates, or certified returns of every Senatorial District or parochial election within the province of this committee and file the same in its records.

After some other executive business the committee adjourned subject to call.
