Lake Charles has a new jail and is proud of it.

Mr. Dan'l J. Goss, a prominent citizen of Orleans parish, died at Lake Charles last week. He was an extensive dealer in lumber.

Surgeon Octave Pavy, one of the victims of the Greely Arctic expedition was a native of New Orleans, and Lieut. Greely himself is a Louisianian.

A colored man sentenced to death in the parish of St. John the Baptist died from fright the very day the Supreme Court was considering the appeal taken in his case.

Trains are running from New Orleans through to Vicksburg on the Mississippi Valley railroad, and New Orleans papers reach Vicksburg the day they are printed.

The Louisiana Educational Association is to hold sessions at Minden on the 15th, 16th and 17th of August. Eleven delegates from the Louisiana Educational Society, of which Col. Louis Bush is president, will be in attendance.

A dark and threatening war-cloud that recently hovered over the vicinity of the Opelousas Courier office has evidently disappeared, as the editor is advertising that he will sell a Winchester rifle cheap for cash or trade it off for a Creole pony.

The locomotive, tender and one box car of a construction train on the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific railroad went through a bridge into Alligator bayou, six miles east of Shreveport, on the 28th inst., killing the engineer and fireman and injuring two colored brakemen.

Congressman William Wiet Culbertson of the Ninth Kentucky District attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself in the head at the National Hotel, Washington, on Wednesday. The wound is a serious one, but he may recover. He had been on a spree and was presumably suffering from an attack of jim-jams.

He who hears but one bell hears but one sound, and people who gather their political information from Democratic and so-called independent papers—apostles of the jersey of Free Trade—are going to be surprised in November by the sweeping triumph of Blaine and Logan. Just stick a pin here, will you?

While the Democratic National convention was in session the Boston Pilot said: "There are many candidates, and many are worthy. The weakest man on the list is Grover Cleveland, whose nomination will insure defeat of the Democratic party." The Pilot has swallowed the ticket reluctantly, but its prediction will stand nevertheless, and Cleveland will be defeated. We have spoken.

The Chief is in receipt of a handsome picture of the grounds and buildings of the Southern Exposition, which is to open at Louisville on the 16th inst., and continue until the 25th of October. A full view is given of the main building, one of the largest structures of its kind ever erected, covering thirteen acres of ground. Five thousand electric lights will be used to illuminate this immense building at night.

The State elections which precede the national contest in November will occur as follows: Alabama, August 4; Tennessee, Aug. 7; Arkansas, Sept. 2; Georgia, Oct. 1; Ohio and West Virginia, October 14. The most important of course is the Ohio election, though West Virginia would loom up as a prominent factor should she give a Republican majority, as is believed not unlikely to transpire.

The Chief willingly accedes to the request of Hon. T. T. Allain of Iberville that our readers shall be informed that the bill for establishment of a Normal school for the education and training of colored teachers voted by Gov. McEnery on the ground of unconstitutionality, was not the measure introduced by Mr. Allain, but a substitute drawn up by Messrs. Rogers and Warren Easton of the State Educational Department and approved by the House Committee on Education. If Mr. Allain's bill had been passed, it might have escaped the constitutional rock upon which the other measure foundered.

The steamer City of Yazoo, running between New Orleans and Vicksburg in place of the Natchez, struck a snag while backing out from Mr. O. Mar's landing, nine miles below Baton Rouge, Thursday morning, and sank in thirty minutes. The passengers, most of the cargo and the boat's furniture were saved, but it is doubtful if the steamer can be raised as she is lying in the middle and her hull is badly broken. The City of Yazoo was a fast sternwheeler, built at Jeffersonville, Indiana, in 1870, owned by Capt. Leathers, Tobin and Cannon, valued at \$100,000 and insured in Western companies for \$20,000. The snag upon which she struck is said to be the same that sunk the Laura Lee.

VERY LIKE A BOOM.

Closely following the announcement made in recent issues of the Chief that many of the leading merchants, steamboatmen and other citizens of New Orleans have joined Blaine and Logan clubs, came the news from Opelousas and Catahoula parishes that the white voters, and particularly those of the most intelligent and substantial classes, are declaring for the Republican candidates by hundreds, and a similar state of feeling is declared to exist in other parishes of the Fifth Congressional District. Hon. Geo. I. Walton of Concordia, ex-President of the State Senate and erst-while one of the ablest Democratic leaders in North Louisiana, is out in a strong, manly letter advocating Blaine and Logan and advising the people of the State to support those candidates. The letter is printed on the first page of to-day's Chief, and we commend it to the attention of every reader of our paper.

A white Blaine club is being organized in Plaquemine and of twenty-five men already enrolled only two have been Republicans heretofore.

The New Orleans Germania Gazette, the leading German paper of the State, denounces the Democratic tariff plank as "an unworthy quibble, incapable of deceiving anybody as to its true meaning." The Gazette wants to know whether the sugar and rice planters are going to carry out their avowed policy of guiding their political action by their material interests, or whether they propose to take the back track and train with a party whose platform is supported and endorsed by rampant tariff reductionists and free traders like Morrison, Cazelle and Hard as vindicating their rights.

The white Blaine clubs in New Orleans continue to swell their membership with admirable material at every meeting. Last week the Central Pioneer Club admitted the following new members:

The first named gentleman, Mr. J. C. Coffield, is one of the leading sugar planters of Ascension parish, a man respected and esteemed by all who know him. Capt. J. A. Comstock, for some time past a resident of Donaldsonville, is well known as one of the most popular steamboatmen on the lower river. Such men as these are an honor to any party or cause they may support, and their adherence to the Republican platform and ticket is strongly indicative of the benefits Louisiana is promised by the success of the vital principles which the Republican party represents in the pending canvass.

It is reported that there is a strong feeling in favor of Blaine and Logan among the white New Orleans longshoremen, and that a "Longshoremen's Republican club" will be organized in a few days with over 200 members.

NEW SCHOOL BOARDS.—The State Board of Education met at Baton Rouge on Tuesday, present, Gov. McEnery, Lieut. Gov. Knobloch, Secretary of State Arroyo, Attorney General Cunningham, Messrs. R. M. Sims and J. J. Mellon, and selected new Boards of School Directors for nearly all the parishes. The appointments for Ascension, Assumption, St. James and Iberville are as follows:

Dr. Law, the first appointee for this parish, died a few hours after the State Board held its meeting, thus creating a vacancy that will doubtless be filled by gubernatorial appointment.

No lists of recommendations having been received from several parishes, it was decided that the old Boards of Directors should continue to act in such cases until appointments are made by the Governor. The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a general meeting of the board be held on the first Monday in October, 1884, to select a site for the State Normal School, to be established under Act No. 21 of 1881, that public notice be at once given by the Superintendent of Public Education of said meeting, in order that the several parishes and citizens of the State may have an opportunity to make propositions for the location of said Normal School.

ANOTHER YOUTH DROWNED.—At half past 11 o'clock last Wednesday forenoon, a colored youth named Robert Johnson, employed at the Peep-o'-Day Hotel in this town, was drowned while bathing in the river just below the LeBlanc saw-mill. Several lads were in the water with Johnson at the time of his death, and were so badly frightened by the accident that they ran screaming from the scene, leaving their companion to his fate. The body was recovered about 5 o'clock in the afternoon and was buried the following day, after an inquest had been held by Deputy Coroner Thibaut. Johnson was said to be 21 years, though seemingly several years younger. His father and mother are both laborers, living in the rear portion of Donaldsonville and employed on the Poytavin plantation just below town. This is the second accident of this character that has occurred here within the past few weeks, and it ought to prove a warning to boys to be extremely careful how and where they venture into the treacherous depths of the Mississippi.

Mr. Vincent LeBlanc, son of our valued friend Mr. J. Elphège LeBlanc of the Belle Terre place, has returned home from St. Charles College, Grand Coteau, La., to spend the summer vacation, and has favored us with a catalogue of the institution for the academic year of 1883-84. A cursory examination of the pamphlet shows that Master LeBlanc stood very high in his classes and took premiums for excellence in nearly all his studies. St. Charles College is conducted by the Fathers of the Society of Jesus, with Rev. John Montillot as President, assisted by a faculty of eleven professors. There were 123 students in attendance during the recent term.

CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION CALLED.

The Republican Congressional committee of the Third District met on 63 Canal street, New Orleans, last Monday, pursuant to the call of Chairman Fontelle, and adopted resolutions designating Plaquemine as the place and the 23rd of September as the date for holding the Congressional nominating convention; fixing the representation of the several parishes the same as in the convention of 1882, except Lafayette, which will be entitled to two delegates instead of only one; requiring the election of delegates to be held on the 15th of September in each parish ratifying the nomination of Blaine and Logan and endorsing the course of Hon. Wm. F. Kellogg in Congress.

From the sentiment exhibited by the members of the committee and at a large gathering of Third District Republicans in Collector Drury's office Monday evening, we incline to the belief that there will be no serious opposition to Congressman Kellogg's renomination when the convention meets.
