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IN PARLIAMENT.

WHERE GLADSTONE MADE HIS GREAT

SPEECH FOR OLD IRELAND.

The House of Commons is a small Hall,

and hard to get into—Members wear

their Hats in Session.

Next to the American civil war, the settle-

ment of Ireland's troubles is the most im-

portant history that has been made in the

last half of the Nineteenth century—if they

are settled, that is to say. Every lover of

civilization and progress is hoping that they

may be, and that they may be decided as

Ireland wants them to be.

Nothing is more remarkable than the

change which has taken place, both in Great

Britain and America, in the sentiment on the

Irish question. Home rule for the unhappy

Irish was an idea scorned with derision by

all but a handful of dreamers and malcon-

nects twenty years ago. "Solid" Americans

and Englishmen alike ridiculed it.

But the Irish began to come over to Amer-

ica by the thousands. Shiphord after ship-

load of them, exiles from their native isle,

landed at Castle Garden and scattered thence

throughout the length and breadth of the re-

public.
