



AROUND THE STATE.

Items of Interest Culled From the Louisiana Press.

Counterfeiter Committed Suicide—Ruston to Have an Orphan's Home—National Bank for Arcadia—Monroe Ousting Gamblers.

Jim Dallas, a negro horse thief, was arrested at Natchitoches.

A fire at Grand Cane destroyed five business houses valued at \$50,000.

Mrs. Ida Meyer died at Lake Charles from an overdose of morphine.

At a term of court just closed at Marksville nearly \$10,000 was collected in fines.

An orphan's home will be established at Ruston by the Louisiana Methodists.

A national bank with a capital of \$50,000 and \$25,000 surplus, has been organized at Arcadia.

Posey Washington, a bad negro of Crowley, shot and killed Joe Gueudy at Gueydan and escaped.

The Association of Commissioners of Agriculture of the Southern States held a convention at Baton Rouge.

Monroe has begun a crusade against gamblers and other grafters and is enforcing the "move-on" ordinance.

A new military company to be known as Company M of the L. S. N. G. was mustered in at Baton Rouge.

The Huron plantation, in St. Martin parish, has been purchased by M. Billeaud, Jr., of Lafayette, for \$51,500.

Mrs. Simon, wife of a prominent farmer near Abbeville, was killed by being thrown from a buggy while on her way to church.

President Chas. Schuler, of the Boli Weevil Association, has issued a call for a meeting of the association at Shreveport, Nov. 3 and 4.

City Engineer C. M. Boren, of Lake Charles, was suspended by Mayor Winterhalter pending an investigation of charges against him.

Albert Baggett, a youth of Singer, had his right arm broken and head badly cut while attempting to alight from a moving train near Turner.

Henry Johnson, who lives near Darbun, celebrated his eighty-third birthday with a picnic at which 150 of his descendants were present.

Peter Anderson, a negro, was killed by Man Wright, another black, on Sweet Home plantation, in Assumption parish, over a dime. Wright escaped.

The Iberville police jury met at Plaquemine to consider petitions for a higher liquor license and decided to allow the present license of \$100 to remain in force.

A joint meeting of committees from Vermilion, Cameron, Calcasieu and Acadia parishes was held at Gueydan to formulate plans for opposing the Mermentau Levee District bill.

Colon Revon, who had been arrested for counterfeiting by United States Marshal Leitch, his deputies at New Orleans, committed suicide while in the custody of the officials.

Charles Darby, who was arrested at New Iberia as being an escaped convict, was released upon the order of Warden Reynaud of the penitentiary, who stated that Darby had completed his sentence.

Dr. Stockings, alias Dr. Kidd, who was arrested at Houma on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses in Texas, and who very nearly succeeded in escaping from the jail, has been returned to Texas.

In the case of the State vs. Wright, Bordelon and Hess, two white boys and a negro charged with the murder of Constable D. M. Lemoine, of Mansura, Avoyelles parish, the negro was found guilty of murder and the white boys were acquitted.

The negro received a life sentence and the others ten years each.
