Valentine to Hang April 28.
Governor Blanchard has signed the death warrant of Jules Valentine, the notorious negro convicted at the January criminal session of district court of entering in the night-time and committing a murderous assault on Mrs. W. C. Hazlip, and has fixed Friday, April 28, as the date of execution. The preceding Friday, April 21, was originally named as the day on which Valentine should pay the penalty for his brutal crime, but owing to the fact that that day being Good Friday a doubt arose as to whether the execution would be legal and Gov. Blanchard decided to change the date of execution to the following Friday, April 28.

Escaped Convict Captured.
Zach Veazy, a colored convict who escaped from the Oak Alley state farm in East Baton Rouge parish about 4 o'clock Thursday morning, was arrested here Thursday forenoon by Chief of Police D. Variani. Veazy was sent up from the parish of Lafayette a month ago to serve a sentence of two years, and had been assigned to work in the kitchen of the Oak Alley farm. He made his escape early Thursday morning and no time was lost by the farm officials in notifying the authorities of the adjacent parishes that the negro was at large. When Chief Variani came across Veazy in the rear of town the fugitive was endeavoring to borrow money with which to go to Thibodaux, from where he probably intended to make his way to his home at Lafayette. The negro was taken to Oak Alley yesterday morning by Deputy Sheriff Lucien Acosta.

Death of Stark L. Davis, Sr.

Stark L. Davis, Sr., a native of Liberty, Miss., and a resident of this parish for the past 26 years, died suddenly at his home on Souvenir plantation at 2:50 o'clock yesterday afternoon, aged 60 years, 4 months and 25 days. Mr. Davis had been in poor health for several months, but it was not thought that his condition was dangerous and the news of his sudden death proved a terrible shock to his family and legion of friends. After superintending work in the Souvenir fields all the morning, Mr. Davis returned to his home about 12 o'clock yesterday and did not complain of feeling particularly unwell, having taken dinner with his family and afterwards followed his usual custom of looking through the morning paper. About 2:30 o'clock he went to his room for a dose of medicine and was seized with a sudden and acute attack of apoplexy, breathing his last within a very few minutes. All that is mortal of the lamented gentleman will be laid to rest 'neath the trees and the flowers in the Episcopal cemetery at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, after services at the Episcopal church conducted by Rev. Bowden.

Mr. Davis was widely known throughout the sugar region of Louisiana as an expert cultivator and handler of labor, and was regarded as one of the most efficient plantation managers in this section. Prior to his engagement as manager of the Souvenir plantation, of the Lemann Co., Ltd., which position he has filled with marked ability and success for the past 13 years, he was employed at different times on Southwood plantation, in Iberville parish, and Bowden and Mt. Houmas, in Ascension. He was a veteran of the civil war, having served with gallantry and distinction in the company of infantry commanded by Capt. Robertson, and was a member of the Knights of Honor order. Thirty-six years ago Mr. Davis led to the altar Miss Emily Louisa Brusle, a member of one of the leading families in the parish of Iberville. The union was blessed with six children, one of whom, Brusie Davis, died at the age of two years. The others are Dr. C. Morgan Davis, of Laurel, Miss.; Mrs. A. Whiteman, of Donaldsonville; Mrs. J. Walton Gaines, of Amite City, and Stark L. Davis, Jr., and Miss Lillian Davis, of Scraper. Mr. Davis is also survived by a brother, T. H. Davis, of Southwood plantation, and a sister, Mrs. W. K. Boote, of Smithfield plantation, West Baton Rouge parish. In the death of Stark Davis, the bereaved widow and children are deprived of the tender care and loving protection of a devoted husband and father, and the parish of Ascension suffers the loss of a valuable citizen and a man of whom any community might well be proud.

To the strict family The Chief can but tender assurances of the most profound and heartfelt sympathy and express the hope that the void in their hearts will be assuaged by the healing hand of time.

Meeting of the Police Jury.

A regular monthly meeting of the police jury, postponed from Wednesday of last week, was held at the courthouse at noon Wednesday, with President G. B. Reuss in the chair and the following members present: L. W. Armitage, J. C. Kios, Albert Esneault, M. G. Sevario and George Bergeron. A communication from Hunter C. Leake, president of the Pontchartrain Levee Board, asking that the jury take steps looking to the drainage and repair of the public roads, was read and ordered received. Myer Lemann was elected a member of the Mississippi and Lafourche Drainage Board to succeed himself. The Lemann Company, Limited, was granted permission to construct and maintain a draw-bridge across Bayou Lafourche, at a point about three miles below Donaldsonville, to be used for conveying cane from their Bayou La Cressant and Belle Terre plantations, on the east side of the bayou, to their Palo Alto factory, on the west side. Leon Picard, member of the school board from the seventh ward, reported that the public school at St. Amant had been completed and accepted and that the contractor had been paid in full. A resolution was adopted recommending the appointment of Henry M. Picard, a graduate in the civil engineering course of the Louisiana State University, as parish surveyor. The resignation of Dr. Paul T. Thibodaux as health officer of the parish was accepted and a vote of thanks was tendered him for his efficient services during his incumbency of that position. There being no further business requiring attention, the jury adjourned until the second Wednesday in April.

Washington Released on Bond.
Johnson Washington, the negro who shot and killed Fred. Hill, also colored, at Levi James' store at Hobart postoffice, in the eighth ward of this parish, Thursday afternoon of last week, was given a preliminary hearing before Judge Paul Leche Thursday morning. The evidence tended to show that the killing was justifiable and Judge Leche ordered Washington released on bond in the sum of \$150. The state's side of the case was looked after by District Attorney Gondran and Attorney R. McCullion conducted the defense.




Proclamation of Election.


